City Council.

The city council with Councilmen Porter, Johnson, Venske and McQueen met Monday evening.

The street committee was given power to furnish lumber for two bridges across sloughs on Railroad street, which were petitioned for, the petitioners to build the bridges themselves.

A petition for an extension of the water system 1100 feet South on 4th street was referred to the water committee with power to act.

The sewer committee was given authority to decide whether the city would pay the expense of constructing the sewer across 5th street or not for the benefit of B. Lurch and O. Veatch, who wish to connect their properties.

The franchise for the Willamette Valley Company's lighting and power plant was laid on the table. Councilman Porter stated that he thought 30 years was too long a time and that a gross tax should be required.

An ordinance levying an assessment against the property holders along 5th street to pay the cost of grading and surfacing that street was read and on a suspension of the rules passed. The assessments are as follows: G. H. Warner \$26.04, Mrs. E. A. Cottle \$26.04, Jas. Sears \$52.09, F. Jordan \$78.50, Geo. Lea \$37, Mally Miller \$36.38, J. Schmutz \$36.38, Schools \$169.68, G. Babes \$78.50, J. K. Barret \$78.50, L. Lurch \$45.41, G. B. Picher \$49.91, J. S. Milne \$45.41, J. H. Garoutte \$49.91, O. Veatch \$37, J. B. Lewis \$37, L. Lurch \$66.15, L. Lurch \$26.54, E. A. Cottle \$33.30, Herbert Eakin \$68.50, Mrs. N. H. Martin \$38, Markley heirs \$37, City cross streets \$273.18.

Councilman Porter stated that a meter should be installed at once for the water furnished the railroad company and also for the Brown Lumber Co.

A motion was made and passed that the city treasurer be given 2 per cent on all moneys taken in for his services and to pay him for opening a set of books for the city and also if the arrangement could be made for the collection of the water rents.

The following bills were approved by the finance committee and ordered paid.

W. S. Bennett, street work \$10, L. Taylor surveying, \$10; Robt. Hann, street work \$2; Willamette Valley Co. lights, \$222.72; J. E. Young, salary, etc. \$13.33; Veatch & Schmutz, hauling lumber, \$2; Geo. Bishes, street repairs, \$2; F. B. Landies, poles extra, \$2; H. E. Underwood, marshal, \$6; G. B. Picher, nightwatch, \$60; Geo. Lea water system extras, \$111.12.

Geo. Lea presented a bill of \$162.90 being the balance on his contracts for the 4th and 5th street work which amounted to \$3412.90 also for \$858.10, being the balance on the water contract of \$15,558.10. H. C. Hart also presented his bill for \$317.03 being balance on the North Creek extension. The bills were held for reports of engineers on the completion of the work. Mayor Job appointing an engineer to make the inspection.

The bill of Griffin & Veatch was referred to the water committee for their approval.

The council then adjourned until Monday the 20th.
