Discussions of the working of the new Initiative and Referendum law are heard everywhere. It looks as though it would be a joker before long. Somebody wants to know if a special election will have to be held to vote an extra tax to pay for all the special elections that will be held in the near future.

The Oregonian claims that the Gamewarden and his deputies have been lax in protecting the open season on pheasants, and states that the birds are very wild, because they have been shot at so much before the season opened. Oregon Methodism has A New Theological School.

Through the generosity of Dr. H. D. Kimball and wife of Spokane, Willamette University has a new department in a school known as the Kimball Theological school in honor of the donor, who gave \$20,000 for that purpose. The dedication services were held in Salem on Monday afternoon, in the presence of a great company of enthusiastic Methodists, who were on hand to hear the addresses by Bishop Henry W. Warren and President Coleman.

The building is the only one of its kind on the Pacific Coast owned by the Methodist Church and its dedication and opening marks a new era in the progress of the school.

Made Deaf by Explosion

S. J. Brund came down from camp on Tuesday. He states that he is entirely deaf in his right ear since the explosion of dynamite which killed Charlie Ruttan and blew Billy Read and himself through the air. He thinks he will get over it after a time, but says the experience was a terrible one in every way. He has felt somewhat sore from the jolting he got, but is thankful he suffered no further injuries.

He had been cutting wood above the camp where the other boys were working and they hailed him and told him to come down and see what they had been doing, and he had only been there about three minutes when the explosion occurred. Ruttan had built a fire and had the powder standing up against a board by the fire and Brund thinks that Ruttan dropped a cap in the fire which set the powder off. When they got to Ruttan they made him as comfortable as possible with blankets and comforts, but were unable to move him until they got help, as Rends ankles were so injured. He said he could tell all the time that Ruttan was bleeding internally on account of the way he was coughing and breathing.

Case Deserts Portland.

C. C. Case, an ex-saloon man of Cottage Grove, left town when it went dry and located in Portland, but found that it did not pay there so he has returned to the Grove

and will open some kind of business at his old stand. He says the Grove is one of the liveliest towns there is around, and he can get along here if others do.

City Council.

A petition for an election under the provisions of the Initiative and Referendum ordinance passed at the last council meeting, was presented to the council Monday night to provide for an election to amend the charter of the city so as to give the city the right to call an election to decide whether the city should have prohibition or not, and stating the laws under which such prohibition should be enforced if prohibition should carry at any such election.

After consideration by the council Saturday the 20th was set for such election, and the following judges and clerks of election were named: R. M. Veatch, J. C. Wallace and J. K. Barrett for first ward, voting place, Tom Allens shop; W. S. Bennett, J. S. Milne and N. H. Martin, second ward, voting place City Hall; Chas. VanDenberg, J. D. Ostrander and David Griggs, third ward, voting place, N. Martin's building.

A letter from the Willamette Valley Co was read withdrawing their application for a franchise, stating that the present franchise under consideration contains provisions they could not accept, but stated that any time the city felt disposed to grant them such a franchise they would be glad to confer with them.

The Willamette Valley Co. franchise ordinance was laid on the table indefinitely.

A request of Veatch & Lawson for a permit to repair their woodshed was referred to the fire warden to report Friday night.

The marshal reported lights out in the town during the month to equal a light 29 days.

W. C. Conner asked permission to borrow earth from a hill street that would have to be lowered, to fill in the street in front of his house. Referred to street committee.
