Improvements Well Under Way.

P. V. Cooper, assistant manager of the Black Butte mines was a visitor at the Leader office on Thursday and stated that work was progressing with a vim up there now. Fifteen hundred feet of flume has been constructed giving 87 horse power or more, which will run a large electric plant, which will light not only the mines, and the plant, but will furnish power to run the machinery.

Two car loads of lime, cement and brick will arrive in the Grove yet this week and the freighters will commence on Monday morning to haul it to the mines and within a short time a large quantity of supplies and machinery will arrive from California to be hauled to the mines and installed.

Mr. Cooper states that the tramway has been moved from the 300 foot level down to the 400 foot level and there new tunnel buildings, ore bins, etc, will be constructed and a crusher installed, which will crush the ore up finely, and will make it possible for the tramway to haul a much larger quantity of ore than when it is in large chunks.

The work on the new furnace is progressing and Mr. Cooper hopes now to be able to make things move right along and to have something doing up there before next summer to help the annual wealth of Oregon.
