Circuit Court.

Increase a Ton Per Month.

F. G. Stiller states that the output of butter at the creamery is growing at the rate of almost a ton a month, but that he will not be able to handle much more than he is doing now until he can enlarge the creamery which he hopes to commence very soon. The farmers and dairymen are paying much more attention to the matter than before and are increasing their herds steadily. The supply of cream has increased very rapidly and if it keeps increasing when spring comes the dairy will be working double shifts to keep up.

Rushing Work at Blackbutte.

P. V. Cooper, assistant manager of Blackbutte, came down from the mines on Wednesday and went to Portland to secure a crew of men for the construction work at the mine. Mr. Cooper states that engineers in Portland are working on the plans for the electrical plant to be installed and that of course until those plans are completed, the plant cannot be commenced, but as soon as possible the plant will be installed and then the work can be commenced, as all power used at the mines will be developed at the big electric plant. Mr. Cooper is anxious to have the work go forward just as fast as possible. Work on the new tramway is progressing, and the big timbers are being gotten out for some of the buildings.
