Slab Slasher to be Installed.
The Brown Lumber Co. management are continually adding to the equipment of the mill to increase the output and save labor. Recently one automatic dog was put on the head blocks and another is on hand ready to be attached. A gang slab slasher is being installed so that the slabs can be cut up more rapidly and also with less labor. The new blower recently put in will carry the heavy sawdust clear to the electric plant, but is only used when more sawdust accumulates than can be burned under the boilers. The company has covered all the roads under the mill with plank so that the teams can get around easily no matter how wet it is, and have also built a plank road to the newly gravelled street. Railroad street promises to be a fine street when thoroughly finished as is being done at present.

Tramway Catches Man.
Fred Ryan, a man employed by the Oregon Securities Co. was injured by being run over by an empty tram car on the cable tram between the Oregon Securities mill and the tunnel a week ago Wednesday. A car was coming down when a car was sent up the slope without signal and several men on the track were scattered around. Ryan was caught by the car and dragged by his right foot and leg for almost 75 feet and narrowly escaped death by being crushed between the cars coming down and the ones going up, by pulling himself around the end of the car. His injuries have proved to not have been serious and while he is still on crutches, he will soon be all right.
