Should Teach Agriculture.

The Salem Journal believes that the Oregon Agricultural College should be what its name implies—an agricultural school only and gives the following good advice:

"The leaders of the State Grange are understood to favor Principal McRea of Redwood City, Calif., for the presidency of the State Agricultural College. He is a man who has practical knowledge of agriculture.

"The grangers have never had much to say about the management of the state farmers' college.

It has been run by lawyers and town politicians and office holders for the most part and not by or for farmers.

The Capital Journal has had a statement from more than one farmer that their boys never had any more liking for the farm after attending that institution. They were educated to look down on that way of making a living.

"In the selection of a new president the regents should cut out the professional men of other denominations, and give a scientific agriculturist a trial—a man who meets the demands of the grange.

"The farmers' school should cut out mining, engineering, pharmacy and everything that is not part of the equipment of actual farm education. Let that work be done elsewhere.

Middle West Farmers Should be Flooded With Oregon Literature During January and February and We Must do Our Part

(Special Correspondence.)

Portland, Oregon, Jan. 7th 1907. Never at any time since Oregon became a state has there been such widespread interest in her development, as is evidenced by the letters received from all parts of the United States by the Oregon Development League.

President T. B. Wilcox of the state League, has just authorized an increase in the advertising in thoroughly reliable agricultural publications of large circulation. These advertisements are devoted exclusively to the agricultural lands of the state, for it is an increased farm population that Oregon needs more than all else combined. Put energetic farmers on the vacant lands, cut up the large ranches and the cities, towns and villages of Oregon will grow and prosper. With that end in view Oregon is being advertised as never before and the inquiry is three times as great as it was during the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

Many communities of the state are sending out literature to inquirers lists of whom are being furnished to each and every one of the sixty-three organizations composing the Oregon Development League. Letters of inquiry are coming in many languages—English, German, Swedish and Polish; letters are coming from every state in the Union, Minnesota, Iowa, Kansas, Wisconsin, the Dakotas, and Nebraska, are about equal in number and it is from just these portions of the United States that we want our immigration. An accurate conception of the enormous correspondence can best be had from the fact that it cost \$527.00 to pay the outgoing postage for the past twenty-five days from the Portland office alone.

Remember that it is in January that you get more readers than any other month, because the farmers in the cold sections of the country are resting, but February is also important. One piece of literature and a letter sent today are worth more than ten during the farmer's busy season.

Oregon Apples.

Apples, red and yellow, bearing on their burnished coats the glint of departed summer days, and in their juices the stored essences of the bright sunshine, timely moisture and balmy air of Oregon, are on exhibition in connection with the annual convention, now in progress, at the State Horticultural Society, in this city. This exhibit is the most convincing argument yet advanced in support of the contention that Oregon is unexcelled as an apple-growing state, and that one section of the state is superior to another in the possibilities of growing toothsome, beautiful and clean apples. The layman, viewing the display, wonders how, where excellence rules the product of every section, the judges are going to be able to award the prizes offered for the "best specimens."—Oregonian.

London, Jan. 9.—Candy is a sure preventive for consumption, according to a leading physician of this city. He says that all children should be taught to eat sugar. He says that experience shows that the candy eater is proof against the dread disease, and that it is almost impossible for him to become a drunkard.

The Battle Over the Empty Grave.

In the presence of a large audience Evangelist T. S. Handsaker spoke on the above subject at the Christian Church last Sunday evening.

The sermon was based on Matthew 28:6, "He is risen," and I Cor. 15:20: "Now hath Christ been raised from the dead the first fruits of them that are asleep."

The Evangelist said in part: "We are considering to-night the foundation fact of Christianity. We all should be interested in a subject of such importance. For if Christ be not risen from the dead, Christianity is a fiction and the future life an idle dream."

Infidels tell us that Christians are very credulous to believe the stories that have been invented to account for the disappearance of the body of Jesus from the tomb.

Infidels agree with us that Jesus lived, died upon the cross, was buried, and that upon the third day the body was gone. What became of it? Here is the real battle ground of Christianity and infidelity.

The Christian says that the body was restored to life by the power of God; that He who gave life has the power to restore it. This is much easier of belief than the story that the guards at the tomb were bribed to tell that while they slept the disciples stole away the body. This story is false for the following reasons:

1. The tomb was sealed with the Roman seal and a guard of sixty-four Roman soldiers was placed by it. To allow the seal to be broken or to be asleep on duty was punishable by death.

2. It is impossible that under these conditions the guards should all be asleep at one time. If this were possible, how did they know that the disciples stole the body?

The resurrection of Christ is the best attested fact of history. After he arose he appeared to more than six hundred disciples who at once became messengers of the glad news. Their preaching did not begin at a point distant from Jerusalem but in the city where all the facts were known; where, had their story been false, there would have been every opportunity to disprove it.

Among the company of disciples were the Apostles to whom Christ appeared at various times. They saw him, talked and ate with him. Most of them gave their lives as martyrs for the truth of the resurrection. No one would die for a lie when telling the truth would save him.

It is inconceivable that a falsehood should have been propagated for nineteen hundred years and have proved a greater blessing than all the truth that has ever been preached. Well may we join with Paul in the triumphant strain "Now hath Christ been raised from the dead, the first fruits of them that are asleep."

1st—To the merchants who may care to extend credit.

2d—To the patrons who may care to ask for credit.

RULES—AS APPLIED TO COLLECTIONS.

1st—All accounts are due and payable at the place of business where the credit is given, thirty days after date, or the first day of the month, unless other terms are arranged at the time of such deal.

2d—No collector will be sent out after book accounts, neither will statements be rendered until account is overdue, and such notice will be evidence of delinquency.

3d—Accounts not paid as per agreement will be closed and no further credit given by any member of the Association.

4th—All accounts must draw interest at the rate of eight per cent per annum from the date due until paid. Such accounts to be secured by note.

5th—Any party receiving an Association letter from a member of this Association and not responding to or acknowledging receipt thereof shall be deemed unworthy of credit. Notice shall be given the secretary and he shall inform all members of the Association.

It is not the wish or intention of the Association to make credit difficult, but to make credit safe and dispense with the inconvenience and expense of monthly collections.
