Several persons from this place were on the passenger at the time of the accident but all escaped injury. The only injuries received by any one was the fireman, who was badly bruised about the head and shoulders. The escape from instant death of the men who were in the caboose was miraculous, as the caboose was smashed into splinters. The local engine was badly demolished, the boiler being broken off and the front truck broken. The loss is about \$5,000.

Coal Mining Near Ashland.

Grainger, Groninger and Brannon are opening up a four-foot vein of coal on the John S. Herrin place, in section 22, Tp. 38 S., R. 3 East, about two miles due north of Ashland. They now have and incline tunnel at about one-third pitch, 11 feet in length. The deposit being developed by good, Jordan & Taylor, on the Taylor place, four miles east of Ashland, is rapidly proving to be a strong vein of high grade coal. The full width of the vein is seven feet, containing a foot and a half strata on the "floor" or foot wall of the best quality of "peacock" coal and two feet of a good grade of coal next to the roof. These with the two large veins of good coal being extensively developed by the Blue Lodge Copper people, on the Dunlap and Furry places, five and six miles respectively, northwest of Ashland, places that city in the center of the coal belt.

Sues for Commission of \$500.00.

J. J. Johnson has begun suit in the circuit court for \$500 commission on the sale of 1002 shares of stock in the Wildwood Lumber Co. of Cottage Grove. The suit is against A. B. Wood, manager of the Oregon & Southeastern railroad, and interested in the Oregon Securities Co., the big concern operating in the Bohemia district. Johnson alleges in his complaint that in March, 1906, Wood engaged him to sell the shares of stock aforesaid, and between March 1st and September 1st, 1906, he found a purchaser and the sale was made for \$12,000, but that the defendant had failed and neglected to pay the \$500 commission or any part thereof. U'Ren & Schuebel are the attorneys for the plaintiff.—Guard.

Died in Portland.

James Mackey, one of the oldest men in Oregon, died Saturday night at 6 o'clock at Mount St. Joseph's Home for the Aged at East Thirtieth and East Stark streets, Portland. He was 101 years old. Mr. Mackey came to Portland from Corvallis about a month ago. Monday his remains were shipped to Corvallis for burial.
