An Associated Press dispatch says, "Japanese children are to be admitted to the white schools of San Francisco under certain restrictions; skilled and unskilled laborers coming from Japan barred from the mainland of the United States and American laborers, skilled and unskilled, are to be excluded from Japan. This is the basis of the agreement between President Roosevelt, Secretary Root, Mayor Schmitz and the San Francisco school board as an adjustment of the anti-Japanese agitation brought about by the segregation of Japanese children in the San Francisco schools. The agreement means the schools of San Francisco will be conducted in the same manner as they were before the board of education adopted the resolution last October providing for the segregation of the Japanese, who are in the primary grades, must continue to attend the Oriental school and that the Japanese children under sixteen will be admitted to classes with white children of their own ages. While the resolution of the school board, as amended reads 'Children of alien births,' it is freely admitted by Mayor Schmitz and his associates that the resolution will apply only to the Japanese children, and the change in the wording was to make it plain to the Tokio government that no discrimination was intended against Japanese children."

J. S. Medley, the well known Cottage Grove lawyer, and Judge McFadden, of Corvallis, are prominently mentioned for the position of district attorney for Lane, Benton and Lincoln counties, which district was created at the recent legislature. Those three counties are embraced in one judicial district with Douglas, Coos and Curry counties. District Attorney Geo. M. Brown of this city, will now have to attend to the criminal work of only the latter named counties.—Review.

Uncle Sam is robbed of some \$173,000 in cash by a thief. The State of Oregon has just been robbed of considerably more than that, by polite plutocratic pirates, who made off with bills that would have compelled them to pay more taxes for support of the people's government.—Oregonian.

**Believes Thief an Insane Man.**

Chicago, Feb. 28.—The deed of an insane man. This is the latest and probably the most likely explanation of the theft of \$173,000 from the United States sub treasury in Chicago on February 20. Moreover, that this madman was and still is an employe of the government, has hidden the money he took, and is dwelling calmly under the belief that he is not suspected, is the conclusion of some of the most astute operatives now at work on the great mystery.

Who this man is and where he is are probably known. His name, it is asserted, has been connected with the case daily, but until the money he is believed to have taken while under the hallucination is recovered and his guilt established, no one in authority dares make a direct accusation. From half a dozen sources tonight there came circumstances corroborating the suspicion. Fellow clerks in the sub-treasury still cling to the belief, so do higher officials. In this case, however, the evidence necessary to convict is lacking. The stolen cash has not been located.
