The death of John Alexander Dowie, removes from the world a most remarkable and interesting figure. His ability to handle men and direct their efforts, has not been equalled probably since the time of Brigham Young, when he led his followers across the sandy

desert and founded the wonderful City of Salt Lake in a wilderness, surrounded by hostile Indians. Such leaders as Grant, Sherman, Napoleon Bonaparte, Wellington and other noted generals, will be duplicated should the occasion occur that will give the opportunity. Dowie, however, had no special incentive except what came to him through the imaginations created in his brain. In seventeen years he experienced the bitter dregs of poverty, the life of an outcast, homeless and friendless, then power and enormous wealth, and at last to die friendless and in poverty. He had induced by his magnetism thousands to believe that he was almost superhuman. But it would almost seem that in the matter of religious belief, anyone possessed of his extraordinary faculty, can succeed in getting more or less of a following. In 1868 in Council Bluffs, Iowa, a fellow suddenly appeared and with a new creed, rites and ceremonies announced himself as Christ fulfilling the scriptures as to His second coming. Strange to say, he got quite a few followers, was welcomed into many homes, and lived on the fat of the land for a few months when he died. That Dowie was a fraud to a certain extent, there is not much doubt in the minds of thoughtful, intellectual people, and his death will probably be followed by a general reorganization of the Christian Catholic Church of Zion, but so changed in its creed and government, that it will merely take its place in the world as one more permanent religious sect.

The Kansas legislature has appropriated \$780,000 for support of its state university. If the legislature made it an even million the people would stand by it for they believe in expending every cent necessary to give the young men and women of that state the best possible education. Here in Oregon appropriations like \$125,000 is only a drop in the bucket compared to what some of the other states are doing to build up the state universities. Yet, Oregon is as loyal to education as any other state in the union and is also willing that what funds are necessary to keep U. O. up to standard with other like Western institutions shall be forthcoming.—Register.
