

MILL MEN PROTEST

alike for Portland and valley mills. to remain in effect for the benefit of the valley points and at the same time assume a position adverse to that principle with regard to the movement of lumber from Oregon to San Francisco and the south.

J. J. Kenny of Cottage Grove said his company and mills in the vicinity have suffered almost fatal losses from the car shortage, and are in no condition to face the advance freight rate. It was brought out that some of the mills have sold large orders at San Francisco at prices based on the old rate, They have not been able to deliver these orders for lack of ears, and the business has piled up, and now they are hable to be held for delivery of the lumber at the contract rate.

Defending the \$3.10 rate on lumber, under which the mills have had a chance to thrive could they have secured cars, Mr. McKibben cited the fact that the Southern Pacific is hauling furniture from Portland to San Francisco bay points at a revenue of \$72 per car, while the company received at the old rate on lumber \$105 per car for each car of lumber hauled from the valley to San Francisco. 


