Found Not Guilty of Having Broken State Law.

The case against Dr. W. E. Best of Cottage Grove, for practicing medicine without having filed his license if he has one, was on trial all day in Justice Bryson's court yesterday. A jury was not secured until after noon and the whole of the afternoon was taken up in the examination of witnesses and a night session had to be held to finish up the arguments. There was a large representation of Cottage Grove people present in attendance on the trial, and very great interest was manifested. The jury was not out any great length of time and brought in a verdict of "not guilty" and the prisoner was discharged.—Register.
