Sale of Lane County Timber Land
A half million in cold cash of Eastern capital came into Portland Saturday morning by one of the most important timber deals that have been consummated in a number of months. Its coming may be regarded as the direct result of judicious advertising of Oregon's splendid resources that has been spread abroad through various sources. The deal was the purchase by an aggregation of Michigan capitalists of 700,000,000 feet of first class yellow fir in Lane county, embracing 10,040 acres, and within easy access of the McKenzie River.
The purchase was made by J. H. Bonnell, vice president of the Hackley, Phelps, Bonnell Company, a lumber manufacturing concern, with headquarters at Grand Rapids, Mich., but whose plant is located at Hackley, Wis., where the company owns 40,000 acres of fine hardwood, hemlock and birch, chiefly.
The deal was made in a short time after the Michigan capitalists, who are all millionaires, had heard the glowing account of Oregon's timber, made to them by Mr. Bonnell, who has spent nearly five months in cruising practically every large tract of merchantable timber in the state. He reported that he considered the one in Lane county as the most desirable purchase of them all and was ordered to return to Portland at once and close up the option, which expired at noon Saturday.
Mr. Bonnell arrived in Portland at 8 o'clock Friday night, and at 11 o'clock Saturday morning the drafts representing \$500,000 were passed over to Messrs. Adams and Griswold, of the Security Savings & Trust Company, which had been holding the timber for other parties whose names do not appear in the transaction.—Oregonian.
