

What Leading Socialists Think of the "Appeal to Reason."

The Telegram's staff correspondent sends the following from Boise: The socialist correspondents at the Haywood trial generally have allied themselves with Dr. Herman Titus, editor of the Socialist, published at Seattle, in the acrimonious controversy developing between him and George H. Shoaf, representative of the Appeal to Reason, published at Girard, Kan.

"True socialists despise the Appeal to Reason," said Mrs. Ida Crouch-Hazlett, editor of the Montana News, the official organ of Socialism in the copper state.

"It is printed to sell, not to help the party, and is making dupes of those who read it. By creating a false idea of the socialist party and its motives this paper is doing great harm. But all we can do is to grit our teeth and hope for a change."

Dr. Titus denounced the Kansas paper in strong language. He says its reports indulge with sensationalism and untruths and that "it is the yellowest rag in the United States."

Shoaf's attention has been called to a startling statement in the Appeal to Reason, to which his name was signed, a few days ago, and he was asked:

"Why do you send your paper such lies?"

"Well, a few little irregularities like that don't count," he answered with a grin. "You know I am here to deliver the goods and have to keep things hot."

At no time since Harry Orchard has been in the penitentiary has Shoaf seen him. Yet he boasted last Saturday in the court room that he had sent the Appeal to Reason an interview which "knocked the spots off anything the dailies have secured."

"Did you see Orchard?" queried a correspondent.

"I saw him in my mind," replied Shoaf, "and that's enough for a swell interview."

The latest attack made by Shoaf on Titus is the allegation that the Seattle editor and his wife have been patronizing a Chinese restaurant since they have been in Boise.
