Corvallis has struck the keynote. The little livestock show of last year has developed into an affair of splendid appointments. A parade of horses and cattle more than three-quarters of a mile long tells its own story. The exhibition of a Benton bred two-year-old weighing 1,697 and Benton bred yearlings weighing 1,200 and upwards tells even a better story. These with other points equally striking make the show a revelation of what the county has done and is doing in fancy livestock.

But the pace set is only the beginning. The show of this year was four or five times as great as that of the initial show of last year. The show of next year will greatly surpass the one just ended. The work to make it great has already begun. Scores of stockmen went home Saturday to begin preparation for next year. Many of them said so. Those defeated are determined to become winners, and those who won are determined not to be beaten. Those who had fine stock are determined to have better and those who had no exhibits propose to enter the field. That means great things for the county. The rivalry is begun, and rivalry is the secret of great achievement. It is the agency that will bring out the best. It means that in two or three years more, Benton county will present stock farms and livestock that will be the envy of the country. That will mean in turn, greater profits and greater attention to the industry, and the outcome will be a long stride in the direction of a highly developed, thrifty and progressive Benton to which far-sighted citizens confidently look forward. —Times.

Attorney General Bonaparte has announced in an interview that the government is about tired of imposing fines on big corporations that recklessly disregard the law. He says that while an accumulation of fines reaching a large amount may act as a deterrent, such penalties only too frequently are paid out of the treasury of the corporation whether they are assessed against individual officers or not, and result only in decreasing the company's dividends and thus striking many innocent stockholders without affecting the high officials who are really at fault. He intimates that a jail sentence which

will have to be served by the officials against whom it is directed seems a much simpler and more effective measure. This will be bad intelligence for the managers of many big corporations who supposed they were "law proof." It will be interesting to see whether the Attorney General will have the hardihood to put his threat into execution. —Review.

The officers of the Oregon Development League will meet at the Portland Commercial Club Thursday evening, June 20th at 7.30 and every active worker, as well as the presidents and secretaries of the different commercial bodies are urged to be present. The League proper will open Friday morning at 9 o'clock at the Marquam Grand theatre and this session will close at 12.30. Afternoon recess for flower parade and general recreation. Friday evening exactly at 8 o'clock there will be a special pipe organ recital at the First Presbyterian church by Professor Edgar E. Coursen, one of the best organists in America, free of charge to all visitors residing outside the city. This is a rare and unusual treat.

The reception given the Omaha business men at Portland was unique in the extreme. The Governor, the Mayor and 100 representative business men met the party Sunday morning at 9 o'clock at the Union depot. There was a street car ride, reception and luncheon today. Roses were distributed to the ladies on the east side, on the west side and the train was decorated with roses; in fact, there were roses everywhere.

The Oregon girls taken East by the "Telegram" reached home Saturday night. Those in charge of Mr. Phillip S. Bates are expected to arrive home tomorrow. They have given the state a vast amount of advertising.

Merited Compliment.

Oregon now has one of the best and most active delegations in congress that she has had for many years, and we should be and are proud of the n. The congressional district is especially fortunate in having elected Mr. Hawley as its representative, as is shown by the work he has already accomplished and by his earnest effort to come in touch with his constituents and to learn their needs and desires. It was largely through his efforts, ably assisted by Senator Bourne, that the attention of the department of justice has been drawn to the violation by the railroads of the terms of the grant which gave them the vast area of land which they control in this state, and he purposes keeping everlastingly at it until the matter has been adjusted fairly for all concerned. In Senator Bourne, Oregon, has a senator that does things. During the short time he has been in Washington he has accomplished much. With his untiring energy and evident earnestness he has to a great extent overrode the moss covered senatorial rule that new senators like children should be "be seen and not heard" and has made a name for himself already. Again he is in full accord with the policies of the administration, and has gained the confidence of the President. This puts him in a position to accomplish things; and he is not one to let the grass grow under his feet. —Medford Mail.

State Teachers' Association Convention.

The official program is out and preparations are being perfected for the seventh annual convention of the Western division of the Oregon State Teachers' Association Convention which will be held at Salem, July 1, 2 and 3. A meeting of the county superintendents of the state has also been called for those dates and will be held in connection with the association convention, which together with the teachers' institutes of the several counties, which have elected to hold sessions here, will combine to make a large convention of teachers and school

authorities here.

The convention will be divided into several departments, among the most important of which will be the department of superintendence, a county superintendents convention, Marion, Linn and Polk county institutes, and special meetings of school superintendents and principals, called especially by Superintendent Ackerman to revise the High School course of studies to conform to the newly selected text books made by the state board of text book commissioners. All general sessions will be held in the Christian church and department meetings in the High School and Christian church. Head quarters for the association will be maintained at the Willamette hotel by chairman J. G. Graham of the information bureau, and as special rate of one and one third fare for the round trip has been granted by the railroad upon the certificate plan.

A Difficult Proposition.

Deputy Assessor Fisher of Linn county is here to confer with Assessor B. F. Kenney of this county, with reference to the assessing of the land affected by the boundary line established by the late legislature between Linn and Lane counties. By the act, the line is to follow federal surveys as nearly as possible and where these cannot be followed the surveyors of the counties affected will try to establish a line as near the crest of the mountain range as nearly as possible. Until that survey can be made, the assessors will have a tacit understanding as to which land shall be assessed in Linn and which in Lane. It will probably be some time before the survey can be made in the mountains. —Register.

Bfg Timber Buy.

E. T. Merrill of Albany was in the city yesterday on timber business. Mr. Merrill, it will be remembered is the principal buyer for Starrett & Hovey of Detroit, Michigan. He informs the Register that he has purchased 100,000,000 feet of standing timber for his firm in this county alone, most of it being contiguous to the Siuslaw river. They are still in the market for more of it, although that was the amount Mr. Merrill was under contract to furnish. They have been buying much timber farther north in the past month. —Register.

A Resume of the Week's Local Happenings of the State and County Briefly Told.

The building boom in Springfield promises to last all summer.

The Brownsville band will play at Eugene on the Fourth.

Congressman Hawley will be the speaker at Corvallis on the Fourth.

Blue mountain wood will be scarce next winter, says a Pendleton man who ought to know.

The Springfield match factory is turning out fifty cases a day, but expects to increase the output largely.

From two acres of land on which peach trees are planted, a Milton man will get \$1,100 for strawberries.

A Forest Grove man has two geese that have laid 118 eggs this spring and have not tried to "set".

Besides using four pounds a week a Lincoln county family sold \$33 worth of butter from three cows last month.

Fire destroyed the entire business section of Shedd last Thursday night. The Albany fire department assisted in extinguishing the fire.

It is a safe estimate to say that there will be \$3,000,000 worth of timber on the Washington county tax roll this season—and this will mean practically one-sixth of the entire valuation of the county.

East Oregonian: There is room for more manufacturing plants in Eastern Oregon. No wool should be sent out of Umatilla county unscoured. No wheat should be exported where it can be exported at a greater profit as flour. The great need of Umatilla county is manufacturing payrolls, workingmen to buy and build homes and patronize schools.

Astoria Budget: The fishing situation to date is about one month behind last year, and much more behind many previous seasons. This sums up the present status of this fishing season and substantially it is a fact, with some canneries and cold storage plants having a little better advantage of the others.

Eugene Register: Why should Oregon import a million pounds of butter annually? and of poor quality at that, when here in the Willamette Valley lies as fine a dairying section as can be found anywhere? Oregon is capable of producing about everything necessary to supply human needs, and four times as much as the state can consume. Let us quit paying a quarter of a million annually for imported butter, turn the tables and be half a million richer by exporting that amount additional.
