Mill Will Not be Built This Year.

The Guard regrets to announce that the building of the big Storey-Bracher sawmill on the Bangs' Park tract northwest of the city has been postponed until next year. Meanwhile all preliminary arrangements and details necessary for the establishment of such an industry will be gone ahead with, and by the time the building season opens next spring everything will be in complete readiness for the erection of the plant, which will be one of the largest on the coast.

There are several reasons for the postponement of the work of building the mill, one of them being the present unsettled condition of the transportation question with the Southern Pacific Company. Another report is that the company, hearing of the proposed railroad from Eugene to the Siuslaw and in view of the fact that the prospects are very good for its construction, thus giving the company additional transportation for its logs and lumber, it was thought best to wait till the present plans of the promoters of the enterprise materialize before tying up with the Southern Pacific Company. The Storey-Bracher people have faith in the proposed enterprise and see in it a solution of the transportation problem in Lane county.

The company is not going to give up its sawmill enterprise by any means, as some might think by postponing it another year. They own a splendid site for the mill and several thousand acres of the finest timber land in the county, and cannot afford to let a matter like poor transportation service discourage them. If conditions are not bettered soon they might take a hand in the railroad business themselves and assist in building the road to tidewater, which enterprise has already been started and which has fair prospects of success.—Guard.

To Name 400 Wardens.

The Oregon Forestry Commission met at Salem Wednesday June 6, and elected Governor Chamberlain chairman and E. P. Sheldon secretary. The other members were: S. C. Bartrum, Roseburg; L. S. Hill Eugene; J. W. Baker, Cottage Grove; H. B. Van Dusen, Astoria, and E. R. Lake, Corvallis.

It was decided that about 400 men interested in the protection of forests from fire will be appointed fire wardens without pay from the state, though most of them will be in the employ of timber owners. Five hundred copies of the new forest fire law will be printed for the information of wardens.
