Council Meeting.

At an adjourned meeting of the city council held Tuesday evening an ordinance was introduced amending a former ordinance regulating the sale of alcoholic compounds used as beverages. The object of the amendment is to make the city law conform to the state law and the fines collected will go into the city treasury instead of the county fund as is now the case, the law being operated by the state officials. Having in possession a United States revenue license is held as evidence that the holder is selling spirituous liquors. The ordinance was read the first time.

The council reconsidered the vote of last meeting on the petition of improving River street and granted the petition and instructed the street committee to begin at once in order that the work may be completed before winter sets in.

A petition causing a great deal of discussion was one signed by a great many of the business men of the city, asking that the city employ but one policeman, he to act night-watch leaving the city without a day policeman. The matter was laid over until next regular meeting.

The finance committee was instructed to open correspondence, through the treasurer, with the holders of city water bonds, for the purchase of five \$1000 bonds.

The council will meet again Tuesday evening.

A Model Warship.

Mr. Hazleton of the firm of Wynne Hardware Co. has again shown his ingenuity and originality in window dressing. Some weeks ago, he built a locomotive out of different articles in the hardware line, which at a short distance away might well have been taken for a genuine lilliputian locomotive. In the show window now is on display the model of a battleship built after the same style, that is of small articles that can be found in every hardware store and really can be classed as a work of art. The main part or hull of the vessel is made of two cross-cut saws bent to represent prow and stern. The torrets are made of some kind of cooking utensils from which peep out brass water taps which give a good resemblance to guns. The masts are built of spools of wire and the fighting tops are shallow tin dishes.

It is not easy to be described, especially by one who is totally ignorant of the names of the different parts of such a vessel, but it is well worth taking a stroll that way and see for yourself. Mr. Hazleton says that he has never seen a battleship and that his model is made entirely from picture. It shows ingenuity and will no doubt serve its aim, an advertisement for the house.
