## THE HALL OF FAME.

Mayor E. Clay Timanus of Baltimore has officially announced that he will be a candidate for re-election next spring.

General Funston used to collect botanical specimens for the department of agriculture. He is an expert on the grasses of the northwest.

General Brugere, former minister of war of France, is expected to visit this country in the near future to make an inspection of American posts and study the organization and the methods of training the American soldier.

A. W. Converse of Windsor Locks, Vt., who has been postmaster there since 1868, except during the Cleveland term, is an enthusiastic collector and at one time owned 200 of the 600 Washington engravings as well as sixty-five "lives" of the Father of His Country.

A close friend of Senator Lodge is responsible for the statement that the Massachusetts statesman for years has received an income from his literary efforts far in excess of his salary as senator. He has written on more phases of American history than any other man in public life. His latest work is a book of essays.

Professor Edward S. Morse, the well known astronomer and author of "Mars and His Mystery," is an authority on Japanese art as well as Martian canals as seen through Lowell's great telescope. He has been a professor in the Imperial university at Tokyo and is at present in charge of Japanese pottery at the Boston museum.

Henry Mitchell of Boston has been for forty years maker of the dies for the stamped envelopes issued by the government, with a brief intermission. At one time a change of administration resulted in his being relieved. But he was not out long—only a few months—for it was soon discovered that no body but Mitchell could properly make the dies needed by the government.

Sir Hiram Maxim, the famous inventor of guns and powder, does not nowadays look much the Maine Yankee he is. He impresses the beholder as being rather a fierce personage, white whiskered and his breast covered with decorations when special occasion calls for such display. For the last ten years and more Sir Hiram has devoted himself to attempts to solve the problem of aerial navigation.

## ENGLISH ETCHINGS.

More than 45,000,000 picture postal cards were consigned to the mail in England during the past year. Clags are still much used in England, at least 4,000,000 pairs being sold in the northern counties every year.

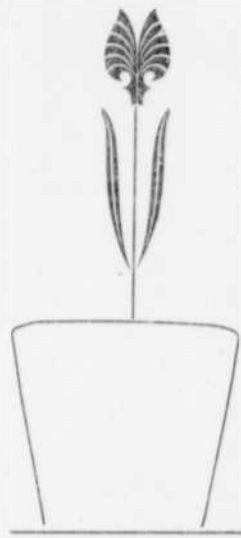

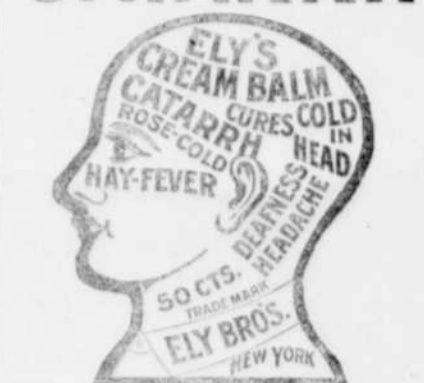
