Fruit Inspector Here

Lane County's Fruit Inspector J.
Beebe of Eugene, was in the city
this week on business pertaining to
his office. Mr. Beebe has taken a
determined stand against the sell-
ing of infected fruit in the county,
and states that he will have de-
stroyed all wormy apples or other
tainted fruits found on sale at the
stores, on his rounds in the county.
He says he has secured the hearty
co-operation of the dealers through-
out the county, in that they agree
to buy no more of this kind of fruit
and we are sure the consumer will
join them. Cottage Grove dealers
say they are willing to pay a higher
price per pound for good fruit, in
fact they will hereafter buy no
other kind, that the best and proper
way to cause the producer to take
better care of their apples and other
fruits is for them to refuse absolute-
ly to buy it unless it is first-class
and after the farmers find he can
not sell his wormy apples at any
price, he will go about to better
conditions and the result will be
that in a short time Lane county
will be producing some of the
finest apples in the state which, she
can do with the proper care.

Principals Resign.

Professors Strange and Harvey,
principals of the Cottage Grove
Public schools, have tendered their
resignations to the school board,
Prof. Harvey having accepted a po-
sition in the First National bank of
this city and Prof. Strange has
gone into business at Grants Pass.
The resignation of these gentlemen
