Principal Elected.
The board of directors of the Cottage Grove public schools have elected J. D. Baughman, of Eugene as principal for the coming year. Professor Baughman is a nephew of D. C. Baughman of this city. He is a graduate of the Ashland Normal school of the same class as Prof. Strange, has taught in a number of the schools in the state and is highly spoken of as an educator by County Superintendent Dillard. The assistant principal has not been elected as yet but probably will be today and also a successor to Miss Buxton of the Seventh grade, who has resigned her position here to accept one in the Portland schools.

THE LIGHTS TURNED ON.

The New Electric Light Plant is Completed and we Again Have Light.

On Sunday, July 21, at 12:30 fire completely destroyed the electric light plant in this city, and many predicted it would be six months before the city would again have lights. The Willamette Valley Company, owners of the plant, said however, that the lights would again be turned on in thirty days, and they kept their word, for on Wednesday, August 21, the machinery was started and "there was light." The Company is certainly to be commended for its excellent work. Scarcely before the embers were dead they had a force of men at work clearing away the debris and work on the new plant was kept up continuously, and the machinery on the ground to be installed as soon as the foundation were built.

The new plant is larger and more complete in every way than the old one, and is virtually fire-proof. The engine is a 275 horse power automatic Russell and the two boilers are of 100 horse power each, with another to be added at once. The dynamo is much larger than the old one and is modern in every detail.

The Company has spared neither time nor money in rebuilding the plant and getting the city out of darkness and our citizens fully appreciate their efforts and congratulate themselves that our city is as well lighted as any in the state.

That Dumping Ground.

The city council at its last meeting brought up the question of securing a dumping ground on which to place and destroy the garbage etc. of the city. The question is one that must be settled and that to as soon as possible. A committee was appointed to secure such ground by lease or otherwise. This they were successful in doing by leasing a piece of land of Mr. Ostrander about one and three-quarter miles from the city, which might be called a bar, putting in to the river, and at high water the trash would be carried off, or it could be burned frequently. A bug-a-boo however, has appeared. Mr. E. King who lives near by, raising a strenuous objection and threatening to sue the city if they undertake to dump there. This will delay matters as the city council will desire to thoroughly acquaint themselves with what rights they have in the premises. But one thing is certain, a dumping ground must be secured, or the citizens cannot comply with the ordinance requiring the garbage to be removed.
