MODELS HAVE WALK-OVER

Defeat Cottage Grove by a Score of 8 to 3—Nearly a Shut Out.

Under the above heading the Roseburg Review of last Monday gives the following interesting account of the ball game played there Sunday between that city and Cottage Grove:
"The Cottage Grove 'Colts' were easily for the Roseburg 'Models' in an interesting game of baseball at Rose Park Sunday. Carelessness in the last inning of the visitors spoiled Dee Mathews' chance of adding another no-hit-no-run credit to his list of pitching performances. Murphy, who did the twirling for the Drain team in this city about a month ago, was the star artist for Cottage Grove, and he was the only one of the visitors who played anything like first-class amateur ball. Using nothing but a slow out, and at times outrageously wild at that, Murphy fanned out fourteen batsmen. He allowed only five hits, but the horrible support which he received enabled the locals to pile up eight runs.
Up to the last inning, Cottage Grove had neither a hit nor a run on its side of the score sheet. Mathews' twisters had been connected with many times, but his support was so faultless that only two of the visitors got as far as second base. When Cottage Grove went to the bat for the last time, the local fans were getting ready to congratulate Dee on another "possible." But it was not to be. Dee in a careless fashion tossed a slow one to Murphy, the first batter, and a slashing single was the result. The next batter flew out. London singled, and Devereaux, who followed him, hit an easy grounder to first baseman Staley, who took a stupid chance to make a double and failed. With the bases thus full Dee allowed Devereaux to reach home on a wild pitch. After the second man had been retired, Sherwood rapped out a double, sending in two more tallies, and that was all, as the next batter fanned.
A recital of the manner in which the locals secured their runs would be painful. Suffice it to say the aggregation against them fielded like a gang of cripples trying to catch a greased pig. The bright star of the "Models" was Bob Yoakum, the youngest member of the team, who marked his first appearance with two pretty singles.
A gentlemen named Waddell, hailing from Cottage Grove, essayed to umpire, but he capitulated at the end of five innings; he could not stand the unkindly references from grand stand as to his judgment on balls and strikes. Bruce Bridges succeeded Waddell and officiated until the eighth inning, when he was relieved by Leroy Bellows of local burnt cork fame."
