A Resume of the Week's Local Happenings of the State and County Briefly Told.

Heppner will have enough coal from Utah.

Wedderburn now has a weekly paper, the Radium.

The Roseburg council has decided to improve streets.

A large panther was seen near Fairdale, Yamhill county.

The sentiment in favor of paved streets is growing in Dallas.

The Weston brickyard has turned out 3,000,000,000 bricks this year.

A Bend man got 49 potatoes, weighing 19 pounds from one hill.

Many people are hunting timber lands and farming lands in Lane county.

It has been proven that good, first-class, sweet-flavored, full-kernal walnuts can be grown around Hubbard.

On account of the low water in the Rogue, the intake of salmon at the new fishery on the lower Rogue 12 miles below Grants Pass, and at the Illinois river hatchery, has practically been a failure.

After boring eight wells on his farm near Dallas, varying in depth from 25 to 175 feet, Ira Stubblefield has at last secured a veritable fountain vein at a distance of only 14 feet under the ground.

Plans are being perfected whereby a practical effort will be made within a short time to bore for oil and gas where indications point for such an attempt about Astoria and on the west side, says the Budget.

Eggs 30 cents a dozen and poultry not procurable at any price, ought to be an inducement to somebody with small capital to engage in the poultry business, says the Vale Gazette. There is absolutely no reason why it should not succeed here.

Beaverton Correspondence: Hillsboro Independent: Al Zwiener raised some corn this year as good as any grown in Illinois. Large corn, deep kernels, well ripened and firm. If we can grow corn that removes the only obstacle to raising hogs.

That the Elgin flyer on the branch line between here and La Grande makes good time was proven Monday, when it required just four hours to make the trip from La Grande to Elgin, says the Elgin Recorder. The distance is 25 miles, and to cover it in four hours is "going some." But this is not an unusual feat.

Hermiston Correspondence: Considerable land is now being cleared by parties who have bought land from different private parties, which will be watered by the government, and it now looks as though many acres of land would be put under cultivation next spring. Many fruit trees are being set out by different parties.

Sixty guests had narrow escapes from losing their lives Wednesday morning when the Hotel Carlton, a \$40,000 hostelry at that place, was totally destroyed by fire. The hotel is a total loss and was but partially insured. It was the property of W. M. Ladd of Portland and W. A. Howe of Carlton.

Paisley Correspondence of Silver Lake Leader: Uncle Jim Foster has sold over 7,000 pounds of peaches and still has some left. F. W. Foster has sold several thousand pounds of prunes, besides drying a large amount, and still there are many bushels yet on the trees. These are but samples of every fruit grower in the valley.

Dallas Itemizer. The vicinity of Dallas is rapidly becoming the fruit center of the Willamette valley. New orchards of every kind and variety of fruit are constantly being set out by persons who see the profitableness of such a venture. It is a fact well known to all that we have the best orchard land in the state, and nearly all our farmers are beginning to see the advantages to accrue to them by the cutting up of their large farms into smaller tracts.
