A Resume of the Week's Local Happenings of the State and County Briefly Told.

A West Chehalis man has harvested 600 bushels of good corn, which he will use to fatten hogs.

A Medford man has been importing Jersey cattle from the east and now has the foundation of a fine herd.

Up in Douglas county four deer were found near together; three of them does, just killed for "fun" and left to rot. And this is "sport."

An Albany chair factory manufactures and sells about 75,000 chairs a year, and it is one of the best paying establishments in that city.

Circuit Judge William Smith of Baker City secured 61 subscribers for Bryan's Commoner in one day. Look out for a big appointment for the judge when Bryan becomes president.

Astoria Budget; C. N. Sherman in an hour and a quarter this morning raised more than \$3,000 on the proposition to organize a \$15,000 oil company to drill for oil and gas in this vicinity.

The Albany police report hundreds of hobos passing through daily for points north and south. Many of these are on their way to Southern California to winter while others are journeying towards the large cities of the north. Seattle and Portland will receive a large share of those going in that direction.

The Lebanon Lumber Company has started up its sawmill at that place after a shut down of about six weeks. It also started a large crew to drive sawlogs down the Santiam river, the last rains having raised the water sufficiently. The company thinks it has about 200,000 feet in the river ready to be floated, which will give the mills sawlogs for some time.

A Portland firm has purchased the bulk of Rogue River Newtown Pippins at \$2.60 per box, f. o. b. Medford. If the average yield is 400 boxes per acre, it doesn't take a very extended mathematical calculation to ascertain that the orchardists of that region are getting over \$1,000 an acre for a single crop.

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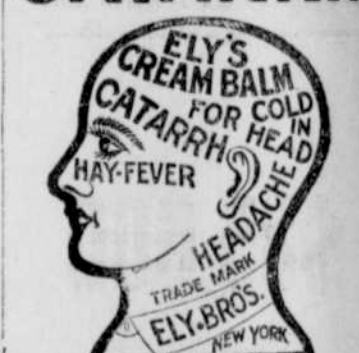
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
