It is understood that the new proprietors of the papers have leased the Oliver Veatch building on the corner of Main and Fourth streets and will move their printing plants therein soon after the first of the year, when extensive improvements will be made in both papers.

Both gentlemen are practical printers and newspaper men of many years experience and their success in this new enterprise is assured.

Mr. Conner was formerly editor of the Roseburg Plaindealer and has been connected with several other newspaper enterprises in this state including the Lane County Leader. He will make some satisfactory disposition of his interest in the Bazaar that he may devote his entire attention to the papers.

Mr. DuBruille is the present manager of the Leader and during his residence at this place with his estimable family, has made a host of friends who will be pleased to know he has decided to make this city his permanent home. We wish the new publishers every success.
