

COUNTY SEAT NEWS AND NOTES

Items Gleaned About the Various County Offices-- Criminals Plead Guilty--County Court Holding a Busy Session.

So far since the first of the year the county clerk has granted 80 hunters' licenses.

Louis B. Hiatt has filed the mining claim, Fair Play, in the Bohemia mining district.

H. T. Dow, the timber dealer, came down from Cottage Grove Monday. He is now located at Cottage Grove.

Frank Dyer, as agent for Kolo Neis purchased the Dickey Brothers lot of hops consisting of 105 bales at 5 cents per pound.

Roy Johnson, who was fined \$200 for violating the provisions of the local option law by selling intoxicating liquors, was released from jail Saturday. His fine was paid and he was set at liberty.

Marriage licenses were issued Wednesday to the following: Verne Hathaway, aged 22, and Miss Grace Eunice See, aged 16, both of Marcola; Roy C. Duntan, aged 25, and Miss T. Ennis Neet, both of Dexter.

Henry Taylor has begun suit in the circuit court against the Creswell Lumber Company to recover \$300, with interest at 6 per cent from November 23, 1907, and reasonable attorney's fees. L. M. Travis is attorney for the plaintiff.

W. B. Hawley, M. J. Hawley and Elva Ward of Lorane, have filed a petition in the county court asking for a road of public easement to the residence of W. B. Hawley and connecting with the Cottage Grove-Lorane road.

Judge Harris of the circuit court Tuesday sentenced Robert Dillon, the man who forged the name of an Albany man to a check and passed it on Roberts Bros.' Toggery in this city, to three years in the state penitentiary, he having pleaded guilty.

A complaint was filed with the clerk of the courts Monday, in which Jordan Purvise, as trustee, brings suit against the Star Consolidated Mining company, to recover \$5000 with interest at 10 per cent, from December 1, 1905 and 10 per cent attorney fees.

The Eugene & Eastern Railway Company announces that it will resume work on the electric line between Eugene and Springfield this month. The company has just secured an extension of time in its franchise for beginning of work of building over the county road.

H. Armstrong and W. Haines, the youths who hired two horses from the Kompp livery stable at Junction City and ran away with them to Crook county, also pleaded guilty and were given an indeterminate sentence of from one to ten years in the penitentiary. If their behavior is good they will serve the minimum time.

A young woman named Hattie Chapman, whose parents live near

Elmira, attempted to commit suicide Monday afternoon by taking carbolic acid and came within an ace of succeeding. Miss Chapman is a waiter and pastry cook at the Blue Front restaurant on South Willamette street and no excuse is given for her attempt at ending her life.

The cases against William Arnold and Mrs. Lynch and Clyde Hastings who were bound over on serious charges were dismissed on motion of the prosecuting attorney for good reasons. This is the sensational case enacted in a Cottage Grove lodging house some time ago in which a mother and daughter figured conspicuously.

Rev. T. B. Ford, pastor of Portland Sunnyside Methodist Episcopal church, who has been seriously ill for several weeks, is reported out of danger. Mrs. Ford returned home yesterday from Hot Lake, Oregon, where she went two weeks ago to assist in caring for the stricken minister. The cause of Dr. Ford's trouble was gastritis, which reached an acute stage six weeks ago. Dr. Ford formerly resided in Eugene.

The city council and some of the police force had a conference with Prosecuting Attorney McFadden and Deputy Prosecutor G. F. Skipworth in the latter's office this week looking forward to an aggressive campaign against the blind pigs that are supposed to exist in the city. A vigorous warfare is to be waged and the plan of campaign is one entirely new. It will not be divulged.

Work with the Booth-Kelly company will be continued at Wendling and Coburg as it now is, but there is nothing more can be promised at Springfield and other points at present. Business is looking up again and a number of new orders are being received but the uncertainty of the freight rates presents a contingency that makes it difficult to figure on delivery of lumber at points east and south, and while some business is expected, matters will not assume a strictly normal basis until the decision of the interstate commerce commission is given out.

The three colored men, John Lewis, M. L. Banks and Charles Sharp, who were arraigned Monday morning, concluded some time after dinner that there was no use to take the statutory time to plead and came before the court shortly after 10 o'clock and plead guilty to holding up Mr. Walker on the railroad track south of Cottage Grove some time since and taking his money something over \$205 away from him. They were sentenced to 8 years at hard work in the penitentiary. Mr. Walker who was held as a witness against the colored men who robbed him, has been given his money and his liberty.

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ROSEBURG PLANT FOR FRUIT PACKING

Roseburg is soon to have another important industry. The H. S. Gile Fruit Packing company of Salem, has secured ground on which to construct an extensive building for packing all kinds of fruit. R. L. Gile, local manager of the concern said tonight:

During the past year, the local pack of fruit by the Gile Fruit company has been approximately 2,000,000 pounds. Eighty people are employed during the fruit season, thus placing in circulation a large amount of money. The Gile Fruit Packing company operates five plants throughout the state.
