

COUNTY SEAT NEWS AND NOTES

County Officers Will Seek Re-nomination. More Law Breakers in the Toils. Marriage Licenses Issued.

County Treasurer Eastland spent Sunday at Cottage Grove with friends.

A marriage license was issued Monday to Henry L. Ryan, aged 27 and Miss Cora Traeger, aged 16, both of Junction City.

Judge Harris of the circuit court, has granted the petition of writ of review in the Mayhew nuisance case and it will be heard on January 22.

The Fitzhugh-Beam Lumber Company, which has a small sawmill near Coberg is beginning to deliver railroad ties to the Southern Pacific Company.

Ernest U. Lee, has filed his petition as a candidate for the nomination of county clerk at the primaries to be held April 18. He is the first candidate to file petition.

A good number of the socialists of Eugene and vicinity met at the store of Manville & McKinney Tuesday evening and voted for seven out of a list of about 100 men to be candidates for national committee.

Charles Mayhew, who received such a heavy fine recently for maintaining a nuisance at his place of business in the sale of liquor, is going out of business and has turned over his stock of cigars and tobacco to Julius Goldsmith. It is said that others who are suspected of selling liquor will quit business soon.

Marriage licenses were issued Wednesday to Marion A. Brewbaker aged 26, a street car conductor at Portland, and Miss Ada Mae Millican of Waltherville. Also to Jasper N. Hogue, aged 52, and Roxie E. Howe, aged 51, both of London. One other was issued but request not to publish was entered thereon.

Sheriff Fred Fisk, when asked by a local newspaper man recently if he would be a candidate for re-election, is quoted as saying: "No I have made up my mind to work for Fred from this time on. I have been favored by the people of Lane county for a long time and I have concluded not to file my petition for re-election."

The Lane County Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association, recently organized, filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk this week with a capital stock of \$5000 and Eugene named as the principal place of business. The

incorporators are named as follows: H. F. McCormack, Geo. A. Dorris, M. H. Harrow, J. O. Holt and Dr. L. D. Scarbrough.

The case against Frank Goodman, who was arrested by Chief Farrington for violating the city ordinance with reference to maintaining a nuisance in selling intoxicating liquor, came on for hearing before Police Judge Dorris Wednesday morning and he withdrew his plea of "not guilty" and pleaded guilty to the charge. His fine was fixed at \$100.

W. R. Dillard, a Lane county pioneer, died at his home at Goshen January 12, 1908, of old age. He was born June 3, 1831, in Knox county, Tenn., and was married December 8, 1853, to Miss Alzura Hendricks, who survives him. To them six children were born, one dying in infancy. After coming to Oregon from California in 1858, Mr. Dillard and wife settled at Goshen, where they continued to live until his death. Mr. Dillard was a member of the United Brethren church for many years.

It is said that nearly all of the officers about the court house will be candidates for re-election. R. U. Lee has already filed his petition for county clerk. R. E. Eastland will be a candidate again for the nomination as county treasurer. B. F. Keeney will make the race for assessor again. W. B. Dillard will file his petition for county superintendent and H. M. Price for commissioner. C. M. Collier for county surveyor. H. D. Edwards holds over for the next two years, so that with the exception of sheriff it is a pretty sure thing that all the county officers will be candidates for re-election.

The whole secret of the sensational effort on the part of Miss Hattie Chapman to commit suicide last week, came out Monday when Clyde Woolwine was arrested upon a charge sworn out by the girl's mother, accusing him of having carnal relations with the girl who is declared to be under 16 years of age. Woolwine waved examination and his bond was fixed at \$600 by the Justice. The girl, thinking young Woolwine had deserted her in her trouble, attempted suicide, but it appears he only had resumed work in a logging camp and came back to town when he heard of the girl's attempt upon her life.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COYOTE CLUB

Saturday Jan. 11, 1908, the South Lane County Coyote Club held its annual meeting in the O. O. Veatch building in this city, there being a good attendance. C. S. Veatch, president, presided and the financial report of the secretary showed that \$85 had been paid out in bounties since Nov. 1, 1907, and that a balance of \$32.10 remained to the credit of the club, which numbers 60 members in good standing.

A motion prevailed that Scott Jackson, the Lorane director of the club be allowed to receive and receipt for moneys and cancel scalps for members in his neighborhood, and report same to the secretary-treasurer.

Motion was carried providing for the payment of full bounty of \$10 to the owner of the dogs in pursuit of a coyote when it is killed by a non-member of the club.

For the protection of valuable dogs owned by members of the club and to discourage the putting out of poison on the sheep and goat range hereabouts a motion was carried to the effect that no bounties will hereafter be paid on coyote scalps secured by poisoning.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Curtis S. Veatch; Secretary-treasurer, W. C. Conner; Directors, Perry Vanschoiaek, Row River; Scott Jackson, Lorane; Jas. Wallace, Coast Fork; Chas. Wright, Lynx Hollow. Adjourned.

LANDLORD AND TENANT EQUALLY GUILTY

Regarding the campaign being waged against keepers of "blind pigs" at Eugene, the Register says: Since the city secured a verdict in the Mayhew case in the matter of declaring "blind pigs" to be nuisances under an ordinance, City Attorney Allen says he intends to send notices to various landlords or owners of property, where it is known this illegal business is carried on, that if the nuisance is not at once abated, they too, will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. The ordinance specifically sets forth that a landlord is equally guilty with his tenant and subject to the same fine and imprisonment.

A LANE PIONEER DIES AT PORTLAND

Alexander Eaton, said to be one of the last of the early pioneers of Lane county, died Sunday night at the residence of his granddaughter, Mrs. G. W. Wilson, 28 East Twenty-ninth street. Death was due to the disabilities of old age. His remains were taken to Creswell, Lane county, for interment in the family plot.

Mr. Eaton was born in Tennessee in 1833, and came across the plains to Oregon in 1852 in company with his wife, who had been Miss Fannie Caton, daughter of a prominent Missouri family. The trip was made down the middle fork of the Willamette river for the first time in its history, the team being compelled to cross the river 21 times.

When the couple reached the Willamette valley they settled on a donation land claim near what is now Creswell, in Lane county. When the Rogue river Indians, became troublesome and were massacring white families, Mr. Eaton enlisted in the cause of the whites under General Olney, and assisted materially in bringing the savages to terms and finally landing the remnant of the hostile tribes on the Siletz reservation.

While making a home in the Willamette valley Mr. Eaton was a great friend of the Indians, and his home was known by them as one of hospitality, which proved of great value in keeping the aborigines of that part of Oregon territory friendly disposed toward the white settlers. He used to keep a pack of fox hounds to hunt bear and deer and his prowess as a huntsman was regarded with awe by his savage friends.

Mr. Eaton's wife died several years ago. He leaves three daughters—Mrs. G. W. Wilson of Portland; Mrs. J. C. Wilson of Goshen and Mrs. Frasier J. Kelsay of Fossil, in this state. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity, and his obsequies will be conducted by the order.—Telegram.
