Revival Meetings Closed. News around the Court House. New Candidates. Mrs. Thomas Files Divorce Proceedings.

A marriage license was issued Saturday to Arthur James Smith of Walker and Miss Francis Willard Higgins of Springfield.

The Eugene Lumber Company has resumed the shipment of logs from Wildwood on the O. & S. E., above Cottage Grove, to its mill here, two carloads having arrived Monday morning.

The committee of East Eugene citizens, who met Saturday evening to decide on the kind of trees which shall be planted along either side of Columbia avenue, decided that their choice was linden.

Judge Harris of Eugene, has called a special term of the circuit court for next Friday to hear the case of Ralph Turpin on a charge of having committed a statutory crime against a young lady residing near Waterloo.

The Eugene Military band played for the opening play of Eckhardt's Ideals Tuesday and drew a large crowd to hear them. The show was also well patronized and will be at Cottage Grove next Wednesday.

Lucetta Thomas has filed her complaint against her husband, J. I. Thomas from whom she asks to be released by a divorce. The complaint states that they were married at Cottage Grove, October 30, 1894, and that on September 15, 1906, her defendant husband deserted and continues to refuse to live with her, and in the course of her allegations reports a liaison with another woman. She asks for the divorce and the custody of their two daughters, Alta, aged 12, and Margaret, aged 5, Medley & Johnson are her attorneys.

STATE C. E. CONVENTION WILL MEET AT EUGENE

Plans for the eighteenth state convention of the Oregon Christian Endeavor union, to be held in Eugene February 20 to 23 inclusive, are well under way. The state president, Rev. C. T. Hurd, of Corvallis, announces that a strong set of speakers is being secured for the convention. The list includes Rev. L. R. Dyott, pastor of the First Congregational church of Portland; Rev. W. H. Foulks, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland; President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon. President Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college; Revs. J. J. Evans, D. A. Thompson, A. A. Winter, and others.

The program is not yet complete, but it includes conferences for the delegates and open meetings for the people of Eugene; also three simultaneous meetings for Sunday afternoon, the last day of the convention—one each for men, women and children.

The railroads have granted the usual one and one-third fare to all delegates.

There are between 200 and 300 of the Christian Endeavor societies in the state, and an attendance of fully 200 delegates is expected.

The application for a road of public easement by W. B. and Mary J. Hawley and Elva Ward across the land of George Norris was granted Monday by the county court.

The Booth-Kelly company is having a drive of about 7,000,000 feet of logs brought down the Mohawk and the tail end of the drive has reached Marcola. The logs will go to the Coburg mills.

It is announced upon good authority that D. P. Burton, ex-county assessor, will be a candidate for the nomination of county assessor, on the Republican ticket, before the forth-coming primaries.

The Eugene Lumber Co. have started their saw again after a short rest and it will probably be kept going until all the logs they have on hand are disposed of. They started to loading two cars for shipment Tuesday.

The great revival meetings which have been conducted for some time at the M. E. church by Evangelist Haudenschild closed Sunday evening with 19 accessions to the church, the converts being mostly men. As a result of the meeting fully 150 converts were made, all of whom united with the churches of their choice. At the close of the Sunday morning service the free will offering was taken for the evangelist and \$550 was quickly given in appreciation of his services. In addition to this \$200 had been raised at an earlier date to pay the expenses of the meeting.

EXPERT MARKSMEN VISIT COTTAGE GROVE

Last week two crack marksmen visited our city, the Winchester ammunition demonstrator, Geo. Morse, and the Peters cartridge demonstrator, W. A. Hillis. Both men did some remarkable shooting stunts at the traps in West Cottage Grove, such as breaking with a 22 rifle walnuts tossed in the air, and in the same way exploding 22 caliber cartridges. They also done some artistic work in blue rock shooting. But right here we want to say that these experts get right up against the real thing every time they come to Cottage Grove, in the person of our young hardware dealer, H. H. Veatch, with whom the breaking with a small rifle of marbles, walnuts and the like tossed in the air, is mere play and he always holds his own with these experts in blue rock shooting. In the contest Tuesday with Mr. Hillis Mr. Veatch broke 100 blue rocks out of 114, Mr. Hillis getting 98 out of the same number, while the Winchester man was also outclassed by the hardware man in the blue rock shoot.

Mr. Veatch has received several offers from ammunition makers to take the road for them and demonstrate the shooting qualities of their goods, but from the fact that such a position would take him away from home so much of the time, he has declined all offers.

DATES ARE FIXED FOR OREGON DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

Portland, Jan. 19.—The Democratic state central committee yesterday decided to choose the four Democratic electors for the presidential election by the direct primary on April 1 next. It was also decided to hold the Democratic state convention in Portland June 16 for the purpose of choosing eight delegates and eight alternates to the Democratic national convention which meets in Denver July 7, and to conform and ratify the election of the Democratic electors chosen at the primaries.

The direct primary law was heartily endorsed and then the patriots turned to their old champion, Mr. Bryan, and by a rousing vote expressed their confidence in him and demanded his nomination for president at the coming National convention.
