News Around the Court House---More Candidates--- City Council Passes Resolutions.

Junction City is working hard for a cannery.

The registration of voters up to Saturday night amounted to 1018.

Car loads of logs are arriving several times a week from Cottage Grove for the Eugene mill.

Mrs. Henry Hohl and children were passengers for Cottage Grove on the Monday train to visit there a few days.

William Odgers has filed location notices on the claims "Confidence" and "Providence" in the Bohemia Mining district.

G. F. Barnhart has removed from Cottage Grove to Eugene to reside. His household goods arrived here Saturday night.

Eleven blocks has been ordered paved on Eleventh street by the city council. The contract will be let as soon as possible.

Charles J. Dodd of Springfield precinct has filed his petition as a candidate for the nomination for representative on the republican ticket at the primary election.

J. F. Robinson and J. M. Williams have been employed by the county to expert the county books from July 1, 1907 to January 1, 1908. They went over the books last fall up to July 1.

W. B. Dillard, county superintendent, H. M. Price county commissioner and R. E. Eastland, county treasurer, have decided to file nomination petitions for re-election to their respective offices.

The nominating petition of B. F. Keeney for county assessor and of Gabriel R. Chrisman for county judge, both of the republican ticket were filed in the county clerk's office Monday.

The county road viewers went to Junction Monday to view and report upon a road in that vicinity and Wednesday they went to Brumbaugh creek east of Cottage Grove to report upon a road asked for in that locality.

The citizens of Marcola are taking active measures toward securing the incorporation of that town. They wish to be in a position to regulate the affairs of their own community, and it is said that a large majority of the citizens favor the incorporation.

Alf Walker and Henry Stewart, who secured the right-of-way for

the electric line to Springfield and on up the McKenzie, are now busy on right-of-way between Eugene and Junction for the main line coming in from Portland via that place to this city.

The president has nominated A. R. Martin postmaster at Junction City. The Oregon delegation agreed to recommend the reappointment of the following postmasters, whose offices have been raised to the presidential grade: Geo. W. Spring, Lents; Ione McCall, Gresham; W. M. Yates, Hood River.

The Western Union has just finished stringing another wire on the poles along the railroad track and there are so many wires that it has been found convenient and safer to take them into a building through an insulated cable. This was done at Eugene on Monday and the same work is being done at all stations along the line.

COUNCIL RESOLUTIONS.

At a meeting of the Eugene city council Monday the following resolutions were passed:

"Resolved, That it is the judgment of the common council of the city of Eugene that the bill now before congress, commonly known as the Tillman bill, which permits the prohibition of the shipment of intoxicating liquors into prohibition territory, is demanded by good public policy and should be reacted into law; and be it further

Resolved, That our senators and representatives be and they are hereby respectfully asked to use their best endeavors to secure the passage of this act as speedily as may be.

"That this resolution be properly authenticated by the mayor and city recorder and a copy hereof forwarded to each of our senators and representatives."

OREGON PIONEER OF 1843 DIES AT EMPIRE CITY

Portland, Jan. 20—Sarah Dameron Owens, grandmother of Mrs. Chas. W. Fulton, died at Empire City, Coos county, at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Her death, which occurred at the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. Ida McCulloch Hanson, was due to dropsy of the heart, from which she had been a sufferer for a number of years. She was 91 years and 8 days old, having been born in Pike county, Kentucky, January 8, 1818. She crossed the plains with her husband, Thomas Owens, in 1843.

Mrs. Owens was the mother of 11 children and leaves 17 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren, as follows: Mrs. Dr. B. A. Owens, Adair; Mrs. H. Abraham, Mrs. W. S. Potter, Mrs. L. Potter, Mrs. L. Olsen and Mrs. L. A. Pike. The interment will be at Empire City.

Mrs. Owens was the grandmother of Mrs. Chas. H. Fisher, wife of the publisher of the Guard, Eugene.

IMMENSE WESTERN RAILROAD EARNINGS

For a railroad like the O. R. & N. to clear up nearly six million dollars on a gross income of thirteen millions shows what immense earnings our railroads are laying away as surplus in addition to declaring regularly four and five per cent dividends. Here is the O. R. & N. with a surplus of nearly thirty millions, yet it is lined up with other roads making equally as great profits in favor of raising the freight rate on lumber shipments east to such a figure as to completely paralyze that industry on this coast.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is aware of these railroad profits as shown by the O. R. & N. report published elsewhere and furnished by the company to the Oregon Railroad commission. Such facts as these are sufficient to convince the most skeptical that present railroad rates east are all the traffic can bear, and if any difference should be lowered, rather than raised.

The big automobile which has been worked over in Portland and equipped with ear wheels to run out of Medford on the new Crater Lake railroad, passed through this city on Tuesday's freight. It will make a unique car and will carry a number of passengers.

rendered after which the ladies served a banquet right royally. The evening was enjoyed and voted a grand success by all.

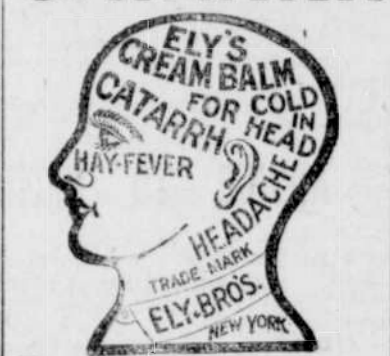
