to plenty of rock and other material being close at hand. The Lorane road district has voted a 7 mill tax which will raise \$565, which it is said with other available assistance will build a permanent road from a point one mile east of the "T" bridge to the summit, the remaining distance from the summit down the mountain side to Gowdyville, a suburb of Cottage Grove, a distance of a mile and a half to be improved by citizens of this city. A local fund of \$800 or more is wanted for this purpose and a committee consisting of C. H. Burkholder, Mayor J. I. Jones and Harry Wynne was appointed by the Commercial Club to raise this fund and this committee "got busy" at once and has the required amount nearly pledged and a permanent summer and winter road from Cottage Grove to Lorane is assured. This prompt action reflects much credit upon the two communities and proves conclusively that they are made up of wide-awake, public spirited citizens.

Every member of the club favored this wagon road improvement proposition and speeches were made favoring it by Chas. Burkholder, Marion Veatch, Harry Wynne, J. I. Jones, Almond Hemenway, George Comer and others. A vote of thanks was tendered the Lorane committee for their interest in bringing this matter before the Commercial Club and W. W. Jackson returned the compliment on the part of Lorane.

The time is perhaps not far distant when Lorane will not only have a good wagon road outlet to Cottage Grove, but a well equipped electric road.
