## Two More Candidates for Sheriff on Republican Ticket. Tax Rolls Open. Mass Meeting.

The new Christian church at Marcola has filed articles of incorporation.

Junction City school district has voted a bonded indebtedness for \$6000 to build a new high school building.

The eighteenth state convention of the Oregon Christian Endeavor Union is holding a well attended session in Eugene.

I. T. Nicklin has filed his petition as a candidate for sheriff, subject to the republican voters at the primaries on April 17.

Prof. E. H. McAlister of the engineering department of the university is confined to his home with a severe attack of the mumps.

Three notarial commissions were issued Monday in the county clerk's office: C. W. Ryehard of Springfield, John V. O'Leary of McKenzie Bridge and J. E. Banton of London.

Mayor J. I. Jones, Alta King, recorder and councilmen Geo. Comer and J. H. Bartels were the representatives of the city council of Cottage Grove who honored Eugene with their presence Monday.—Register.

William Bainbridge of Creswell, was in Eugene Tuesday for the purpose of swearing out a warrant for the arrest of William J. Culver for assault and battery. The trouble occurred at Creswell Tuesday. He alleges that Culver, without provocation, knocked him down, and then jumped on his face with his shoes, disfiguring his face very badly. A few days ago Mrs. Bainbridge sued her husband for a divorce and Bainbridge accuses Culver of causing the trouble between them. The warrant was issued out of Justice of the Peace Bryson's court later in the day and served upon Culver at Springfield by Constable Plank. He came over and pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 and costs, which he paid.

While the tax rolls for the payment of 1907 taxes opened Monday owing to the prompt response to the notices sent out several thousand dollars were taken in on taxes Saturday. J. M. Stafford, to whom the first receipt has been issued for the past eleven years was again the first to get his receipt and it called for over \$128. The big day, however, was Monday. The three per cent rebate which is offered to persons who pay up, to March 15, is a great incentive and gets taxes in very quickly. It is an indication of good times and prosperity when people try to get ahead of each other to pay their taxes.

There will be a monster mass meeting of Lane county republicans at the court house Saturday, February 29, beginning at 10:30 o'clock for a full and free discussion of all matters pertaining to the forthcoming political campaign in this county. This meeting is put far enough ahead so that republicans from all parts of the county can be present and the hour is set for 10:30 a. m. so that business can be transacted in time for those from a distance to return home the same day. All members of the county central committee as chosen at the election two years ago or appointed in their respective precincts are urged to attend.

### A LIVE, WALKING TEMPERANCE LECTURE

James B. ### Roseburg Editor Dead.

Dr. J. W. Strange, one of the best known Douglas county citizens died of dropsy at his Roseburg home Sunday morning, aged 55 years. He was born in Tennessee Nov. 21, 1852, located at Wilbur, Douglas county in 1871, and was married to Miss Francis Cox in 1879. In the 80's he was reading clerk of the Oregon house and chief clerk of the senate. He served as school superintendent of Douglas county and was editor of the Roseburg Plaindealer for several years, after which he edited the Pendleton Tribune. Later he returned to Roseburg and after practicing dentistry for a number of years, with his son Dale, established the Roseburg Spokesman, which he edited up to the time of his late illness. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and I. O. O. F. A. O. U. W. and W. O. W. lodges. A wife, son, and several brothers survive him.
