The number of voters registered at the county clerk's office up to Saturday was 2581. At this time two years ago the number was 2573.

There will be at least three candidates for the Republican nomination for assessor at the primaries in April. Besides the present incumbent, B. F. Keeney, and former assessor D. P. Burton, who have already filed their nominating petitions, Paulus D. Newell of this city, has announced his intention of running and will file his petition with the county clerk in a few days.

Waller B. Dillard has filed his nominating petition for county superintendent, subject to the decision of republican voters. He makes the following statement on his petition: "I will devote all my time and energies towards making the schools of Lane county the best in the state of Oregon; for the best education possible is none too good for the boys and girls of Lane county, and will conduct the affairs of my office in a business like manner."
