

COUNTY SEAT NEWS AND NOTES

Southern Pacific Sued for \$100,000. Cottage Grove, Lorane Road Gets \$500, Marcola Hotel Burned. Republican Rally.

A sixty acre English walnut orchard is being set out near Junction by A. R. Martin.

The old Southern Pacific depot at Eugene is being moved away to make room for a \$30,000 modern structure.

Paulus D. Newell filed his petition for the nomination of assessor, subject to the decision of republican voters at the primaries.

Augustus C. Jennings has filed his petition as a candidate for member of the legislature, subject to the decision of republican voters at the primaries.

An organization of a Methodist Episcopal church was effected at Irving Sunday, March 1st at 11 o'clock, with nineteen members, Rev. Downs of Junction City, presiding.

In the last week and a half, County Treasurer Eastland has paid off \$8500 in county warrants and will pay them off as fast as the tax comes in. He says he hopes to be able to come to a cash basis about the middle of April or 1st of May.

Over 3000 voters have now registered for the coming primaries and election and in view of the fact that nearly a month still remains for registration, there is every indication that the total this time will be greater than it was two years ago.

Upon petition of a number of citizens who agree to perform labor equivalent to different sums of money, the county court today granted the prayer of the petitioners for an appropriation of \$500 for the improvement of the McKernon road, west of Cottage Grove, the money to be expended under the direction of M. B. Stone.

One of the most important cases to be tried at this term of court is the case of Michael Doyle against the Southern Pacific company, who sues for \$100,000 for personal injuries received at Divide something over a year ago, Doyle having had both legs cut off by an engine running over him. Both sides have the ablest legal talent in the state that could be secured. A. S. Bennett and Sinnott and Sinnott and Adams appear for plaintiff and Fenton, Leiter and Pipes for the defendant company.

The Marcola hotel was destroyed by fire Monday morning. The building is a total loss and all the contents except a piano and two or three chairs were burned. The origin of the fire is a mystery. The building was erected last summer by C. Cole, founder of the town of Marcola, at a cost of about \$4000. It was a three-story structure and contained 20 rooms besides the office, parlor, dining rooms, kitchen, etc. The furniture was owned by B. A. Seelye and was leased by Monte Miller, who had been conducting the hotel only about 2 and a half months. The building was well furnished, the loss on the furniture being about \$2500. The fire occurred at a time when everybody in the hotel was asleep, and there were narrow escapes for some of the guests. Many of them got out of the building with their clothing, but some had no time to pick up any of their belongings and were compelled to go out into the night air with nothing but their night clothes on. Some of the guests lost all of their belongings. Jack Littell lost \$150 in cash and clothing; L. T. Brown lost \$20 in cash and much clothing; Dick Cleveland lost \$30 in cash, his pension papers and clothing, and the losses of others were perhaps as great.

The loss to the landlord's personal effects was \$500. The building and contents were partially insured.

Eli Perkins left for Portland Tuesday to buy a sawmill, which will be located on Coyote creek about a mile north of his place. The mill will have a daily capacity of 25,000 feet and expects to have it in operation this fall. His son, John, is interested with him.

The Eugene Circuit court jury and lawyers in the Doyle damage case visited Divide yesterday in a special car furnished by the S. P. company to view the scene of Doyle's accident wherein he lost both legs by being run over by an engine, for which he is suing the company for \$100,000.

Frank Markeite Monday instituted suit in the circuit court against his wife, Sarah, for divorce and for the custody of their two minor children. They were married at Creswell, Lane county, January 15, 1890. The defendant alleges that his wife deserted him in Douglas county, in July 1897, and further alleges that she has been guilty of adulterous relations with one Andrew Butucci, who is now in the county jail at Eugene serving a sentence for the crime, and his wife was in the city jail of Cottage Grove serving a similar sentence. J. S. Medley is attorney for the plaintiff.

The Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway company, Monday placed a force of about twenty men and five teams to work on the Eugene-Springfield trolley line. The force will be increased later on, when the weather becomes better. The crossing to be placed at the junction of the line with the Southern Pacific Railway at the end of East Thirteenth street will not be here for two weeks yet, and the company figures that with the present force the line will be completed to the railroad by that time. Contractors are now figuring on the trestle work to be built along the bottom from Judkins' Point to the bridge across the river at Springfield, for which L. N. Roney has the contract and work on which will begin as soon as the water is low enough to permit of the laying of concrete for the piers.

Resolved, That we pledge our united support to the bill now pending before the people for support of the university.
