COUNTY SEAT NEWS AND NOTES

Monday Lillie M. Hart was granted a divorce from James J. Hart.

John Hunzicker's plans for the new five-story Odd Fellows' block have been accepted.

The notarial commission of Fingal Hinds of Cottage Grove was filed with the county clerk last week.

A marriage license was issued by the county clerk Saturday to Arthur L. Leonard aged 24, and Esther M. Ritchey, aged 18, both of Cottage Grove.

Earl Hill, the baseball player, who made such a good record as a third baseman in the Eugene team last year will go to Tacoma with Ralph Weed to play with the team there.—Register.

The meeting of the Lane County Democratic Central committee which was to have been held in the court house last Saturday was postponed until Saturday of this week.

The Southern Pacific company has just paid its tax which amounts to over \$53,000. This is exclusive of the tax on its contracted lands. The receipt that Sheriff Fisk issued to the company on this occasion represented by far the largest amount ever paid in Lane county by any individual, company or corporation and County Assessor B. F. Keeney wears a broad smile, for he is the man that did it with his little pencil.

Presentation of regimental colors by Governor Chamberlain to the Fourth Regiment, O. N. G., at the armory Tuesday evening was witnessed by a packed house in the presence of the officers and men of Companies A and C Eugene, G of Albany and E of Cottage Grove, and officers of the other companies in the regiment. Governor Chamberlain as commander-in-chief made the presentation speech and the colors were accepted by Colonel Voran in a short address of appreciation and pledging fidelity to the flag.

A Well Kept Poultry and Hop Farm

This office is in receipt of an interesting letter from E. K. Brown, proprietor of the Eugene Poultry farm, who it will be remembered carried away 15 prizes from the Cottage Grove poultry show last winter including one silver cup. This farm has made itself famous during the past show season by winning seventy-nine prizes at three shows with its White and Barred Rocks, White and Black Leghorns, Black Langshans and White Orpingtons. However, fancy feathers are not altogether what Mr. Brown is breeding for as his main object is the production of eggs. He now has about 600 birds and expects to raise about 2000 chicks if possible, this year. About a thousand of these will be Leghorns. The selling of day-old chicks will be one of the chief branches of the business during the spring months. Large orders have already been received and more are coming daily. Mr. Brown can supply either eggs or chicks in any quantities desired from his several breeds. Mr. Brown has adopted the colony house, 6x12 feet, while some are made from two piano boxes, their backs being removed and the boxes put together; these are covered with patent roofing, the front of one being removed and covered with inch netting. Nests and roosts are fitted in and here is an ideal open front house that has cost but a few dollars and will house comfortably a dozen or fifteen fowls. A burlap curtain over the open front is used in the very coldest weather. Great care is taken to prevent any of the breeds from mixing so that any one purchasing eggs or stock can be sure of their purity.

The late rains have enabled the company to bring down its two drives of logs and as soon as the boiler can be installed, the mill will be started again. It is on a better footing now than ever before.

The Warren Construction company have put their rock crushers at the quarry to work and the crushed rock is being hauled to various places about town where it is to be used on the street paving. The crushers will probably be kept at work constantly now until there is enough rock crushed to complete the work and that will take the most of the summer. The curbing men are putting in the curb on Eighth street as fast as possible.

PAID \$7,500 FOR FIVE CHICKENS.

While in New York in January, I. She insisted on a price being quoted and the owner named \$7,500 as his best cash price. Madam Paderewski presented her check in that sum and ordered the birds shipped to her Switzerland home where she has many varieties of fine fowls. This is the biggest price ever paid for a pen of chickens in the world, and the birds were from Missouri too. The Kellerstrass farm has one hen which the owner has refused \$2,500 for, said to be the whitest and most perfect hen in the world. Who says there is no money in poultry?
