Logging operations throughout the Columbia river district are expected to open up within the next two or three weeks. About 3000 men would be needed to supply all the camps with normal forces. It is said that white labor is scarce, because many of the men have drifted to other parts since the shutting down of outdoor work last fall. Wages for loggers, which last year ranged from \$2.25 to \$3.75 per day, will this season start at \$2 to \$3.25. There are plenty of foreigners available for common labor, but logging bosses usually prefer native born help.

Grand Piano Lecture-Recital.

Rarely is the music lovers of Cottage Grove given an opportunity to hear such a musical treat as is in store for them soon, when Edward Baxter Perry, the great pianist will give a recital in this city. More than many another pianist before the public, Mr. Perry is an educator. He attracts not by a great blowing of managerial trumpets or laying stress on his absence of sight. Many persons rush to hear Rosenthal and Paderewski to witness a finely graduated display of dignified dexterity; they think more of the acrobat than of the musician. And these members delight to dazzle with their brilliant technic and they make up their programs largely of compositions of heroic mold.

But Mr. Perry chooses such works as he thinks have a tale to tell and for twenty years he has been carrying the gospel of beauty in music throughout the length and breadth of the land—a blind man traveling alone, preaching the love of musical aesthetics in towns and cities by the score. And to paraphrase this oft-quoted saying, Edward Baxter Perry finds stories in sonatas, battles in ballads, love tales in nocturnes, good in the whole field of piano music.
