COUNTY SEAT NEWS AND NOTES

Miss Edna Yarnell Drowned in Mill Race. Death of Mrs. Lakin. To Vote on Local Option Another Raid on Blind Pigs

Register McFarland reports 4723 registrations to date and the time is up April 7.

Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Gray returned from attending the Spear-Langdon wedding at Cottage Grove Monday.

Sunday was the 98th birthday anniversary of Grandma Todd, the oldest person in Lane county, who is an inmate of the old people's home of the Eugene Christian church. She attended Sunday school and church and deposited 98 cents in the Sunday school birthday box.

Tuesday the petition for the local option election was filed and the question of whether or not the sale of liquor shall be prohibited in Lane county will be placed on the ballots at the coming June election. The petition contains the names of 591 legal voters of the county, the clerk having gone over the list and struck out all of the names which do not appear on the registration books. There were not many of them. The law requires ten per cent of the voters of the county to sign the petition and many more than the required number were on. The petition was circulated during the past two months by those opposed to the present "dry" condition of the county and these have hopes that they will win out at the polls.

Late Wednesday afternoon Miss Edna Yarnell, daughter of J. E. Yarnell of this city, was drowned in the race. She and Miss Vesta Davis were canoeing, when the boat capsized. Miss Davis succeeded in reaching the shore but Miss Yarnell sank to the bottom. The drowning occurred just below the island. Miss Yarnell's body was recovered at 10:10 only a hundred feet from where the accident occurred. Early in the evening her uncle took charge of the search and with a party of university students began a systematic search. Stoddard, a freshman, held the line that caught on her sleeve. Coroner Gordon was notified, but he did not deem an inquest necessary as the drowning was clearly accidental. She was about 20 years of age and a music student at the U. of O. She has many relatives, at Cottage Grove, the McFarlands and others.

Prof. H. C. Baughman of Springfield, will make the race at the primaries for the republican nomination of county school superintendent.

Mr. and Mrs. James Redford, J. W. Kirk and Zeno Earl were down from Cottage Grove Monday as witnesses before the branch land office.

Rev. J. L. Beatty, formerly of Cottage Grove, now pastor of the Methodist church at Lebanon was in the city consulting with Presiding Elder Wire in reference to some contemplated improvements to their church building. The plans were worked out by a local architect and show a handsome perspective and a very convenient interior. The building will be raised and a kitchen, dining room and church parlors be located in the basement.

A raid was made on Thomas Linn's restaurant at the corner of Sixth and Willamette streets Tuesday by the police and Linn, the proprietor, was placed under arrest, charged with selling liquor in violation of the local option law. William Arnold, who was working at the restaurant, was arrested on the same charge by Chief of Police Farrington. Both appeared in the justice court. Arnold pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$200 and to serve ten days in jail. The case against Linn was dismissed on account of lack of evidence against him.

Mrs. Sarah E. Lakin, wife of David R. Lakin, died at her home 170 East Eighth street, Eugene, Sunday March 29, 1908 at 12.10 p. m., aged 69 years, 1 month and 6 days. The cause of death was grippe with complications. She had been confined to her bed only a day or so, although she had not been well for a long time. Mrs. Lakin was born in Adair county, Mo., and crossed the plains with her husband, M. T. Bransfetter, in 1864, settling in the Long Tom valley in Lane county. Mr. Bransfetter died March 28, 1883. About six years afterward his widow married David R. Lakin, who survives her. They were married in Eugene, but lived for a number of years 25 miles west of here, coming to town about ten years ago and residing here since.
