

**PROF. BAUGHMAN, SPRINGFIELD
OUT FOR SUPERINTENDENT**

H. C. Baughman, professor of the Springfield schools, has been prevailed upon for some time to file his petition for the nomination on the Republican ticket for school superintendent. Not until this week was he influenced to even entertain such a thought, but so strong was the sentiment that he could get the nomination that he has at last decided to enter the race. For the past ten years Mr. Baughman has been one of Lane county's most successful teachers. For a time prior to coming to Springfield he was principal of the Garry school at Eugene, but at an advanced salary he accepted the schools at this place. Mr. Baughman has assisted with County teachers' examinations for four successive years. Since taking the principalship of the Springfield schools he has made very gratifying progress for its betterment.

The board is so well pleased with his discipline in the school room that they have offered and almost insisted on his accepting the principalship of the schools for another year, and have offered him a raise in salary. His exceptional ability, together with his great energy in expediting matters in the school room has given his staff of assistants and scholars perfect confidence and has caused the Springfield schools to rank among the very best in the state. Mr. Baughman would make one of the most able and best qualified school superintendents in Lane County. He is a man of dignified bearings, yet his affable ways and quick conception of the necessities of the public school over the county, together with the fact that he is a native son, educated in Lane County, should make him a strong candidate for the nomination for County superintendent at the primaries, April 17th.—Springfield News
