Tomorrow will appear in the parade the new delivery wagon of the Cottage Grove steam laundry and it cannot fail to attract much attention. The wheels and running gears are painted a bright red. The bed is very artistically designed, cab style with a glass window at either end of the seat and also in the rear of the vehicle. The rear end is also equipped with double doors for removing packages and they fasten with a silver knob lock. The sides of the cab bear large landscape views and a very artistic sign for the laundry. The painting is all covered with a heavy finish of coach varnish which gives it an elegant appearance.

The vehicle was turned out of George Hohl's blacksmith shop and is certainly a fine piece of work.

Wynne Residence Being Enlarged.

A. L. Wynne is building a large addition to his mother's residence on Locust street. This home was one of the first built on the east side of the river in this city and was erected by the pioneer physician, Dr. Wynne in 1868. The sills and rafters are all made of hewn timber, while the lumber in this residence was sawed at Rouse's mill on the Coast Fork, south of Cottage Grove, was hauled to the planer at Springfield, 20 miles north of this city, where it was dressed and hauled back to Cottage Grove. The lumber and timbers are still in a good state of preservation and this pretty home is surrounded by great locust, cedar, walnut, cherry and pear trees, which were planted about the time the residence was built. Dr. Wynne died many years ago, but his widow and son, A. L. Wynne still reside on the old home place, around which a city has been built.
