Ford Arrested in Klamath--Booth-Kelly Building Logging Railroad. Canning Cherries.

The electric cars will be running to the suburbs of Springfield almost before we are aware of it.

Frank Haley has filed on a certain mining claim in the Bohemia district, which he will call "Norma."

Attorney Lee M. Travis left Thursday morning for Denver to attend the National Democratic convention as an Oregon delegate.

The Allen cannery started to work Wednesday under the direction of W. G. Allen for the Fruit Growers' association. It is canning Royal Ann cherries.

W. L. Ford, formerly of Eugene but later of Springfield, where he conducted the dining room of the Hotel Springfield, was arrested at Klamath Falls this Wednesday by the sheriff there upon a bench warrant issued by the circuit court at its last term in Eugene. Ford is charged with the illegal sale of liquor. Deputy Sheriff Bown started for Klamath Falls at once to bring him back to Eugene for trial.

Next Monday, July 6, is the date on which the new term of the several county officers who were re-elected at the June election and of the initial term of Sheriff-Elect Harry L. Bown, begins. Mr. Bown will be the only new officer in the court house, all the others holding over or were re-elected. There will probably be no change in the personnel of the forces at any of the offices, for the present, at least. Sheriff-Elect Bown has worked as deputy with Deputy Sheriffs Hammond, Wallis and Parker, and is well satisfied with their work, so there will doubtless be no change at all there.

EUGENE MAN CLASS-MATE OF MR. SHERMAN

There is at least one man in Eugene who is well acquainted with Mr. Sherman, the republican nominee for the vice-presidency. This is Attorney S. D. Allen, who was for four years a classmate of Mr. Sherman at the Hamilton college.

Regarding Mr. Sherman, Mr. Allen says: "Upon graduation Mr. Sherman studied law, and after a little was elected mayor of the city of Utica, New York. At the close of his term, or shortly after, he was elected to Congress, to which body he has since been continually re-elected. Mr. Sherman is a man of exemplary habits, a good talker, extremely popular with all his associates, but above all a shrewd, adroit politician. He has for many years been one of the republican managers in the house of representatives. He is one of the best parliamentarians in the country, and admirably qualified to preside over the United States senate. He has not practiced law, but has been engaged in business, being president of the Utica Trust company, and interested in the canning business.

How to Keep Water Cold.

"Having tried it, I recommend the following mode of keeping ice water for a long time in a common pitcher," says a writer in Woman's Home Companion for July. "Place between two sheets of thick brown paper a layer of cotton batting about half an inch in thickness; fasten the ends of the paper and batting together, forming a circle, then sew or paste a crown over one end, making a box the shape of a stovepipe hat minus the rim. Place this over an ordinary pitcher, filled with ice water, making it deep enough to rest on the table so as to exclude the air, and you will be astonished to see the length of time that the ice will keep and the water remain cold after the ice has melted."

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
