AN OLD OREGON NEWSPAPER.

In remodeling the pioneer home of his mother, in this city, which was built in 1868 by Dr. A. L. Wynne, deceased, Armand Wynne discovered an old newspaper in the garret which proved to be a copy of the "Daily Oregon Herald" published at Portland, bearing the date, September 29, 1871.

We also note the announcement of the "West side stage line" carrying mail and express from Portland to Corvallis and all way points.

The wedding notice of Benjamin Barlow and Margaret Galloway is recorded.

The paper announces that "daily trains are running between Portland and Harrisburg," a distance of about 100 miles and close connections are made at Harrisburg with the stages of the Oregon and California railroad.

The paper says it is "the official paper of the state, of Multnomah county and of the cities of Portland and East Portland."

The Portland Oregonian is mentioned in a warm editorial controversy regarding the defalcation of one, Norton.

The Linn county fair at Albany is given considerable notice concluding with the statement that "a drunken gambler in the Portland lunch rooms shot a young man by the name of Jack Hogan in the right arm. The shooter was arrested and is now in jail."

A foreign dispatch dated at London says, "Napoleon remains at Newcastle. He has suffered lately from rheumatism." And all this only 37 years ago.

"Nobody's" magazine published monthly by the promotion department of the Eugene Commercial club came out with its July edition designated as "Cottage Grove number." All of its illustrations of farm and industrial scenes were made from photographs taken hereabouts especially for this edition and the write-ups were all carefully prepared by local people familiar with their subject matter—very few being overdrawn. Four thousand copies of this number of "Nobody's" was issued, of which 2,300 will be distributed among home-seekers in the east and middle west, 700 throughout Oregon and 1,000 by the Cottage Grove Commercial club. That it will bring many settlers and investors to Cottage Grove is an assured fact, and it will prove a very valuable advertisement for Cottage Grove and South Lane county. John Hartog, the Eugene booster, was instrumental in securing and compiling the matter for this valuable publication.

No meeting was ever called in Oregon which has attracted the universal enthusiasm that has been created by the Oregon Good Roads Conference, which is to be held in the Convention Hall, 6th floor, of the Portland Commercial Club on Tuesday, Aug. 11th. An effort will be made to call the meeting to order promptly at 9:30 A. M. so that there may be a morning, an afternoon and an evening session. The railroads have made a rate of a fare and a third for the round trip for this occasion. Delegations representing every graunge, the commercial bodies, and the different counties to be appointed by the county judges, are already reporting that they will be present. Every editor in the state is a delegate at large, as is the mayor of every city, and every county commissioner. A program is being prepared, but every effort will be made to get rid of long winded speeches and to get down to actual work that will produce results.

Col. Henry Watterson, the Harvey Scott of Kentucky journalism, concludes a very enthusiastic editorial on Bryan's nomination and Denver Democratic platform, thus eloquently: "Better, yea, a thousand times better, the old faith and the old flag, so that if we must go down we shall go down shouting. That is the soul of Democracy, untrifled and undefiled. That is the spirit which snatches brands from the ashes and sets them blazing upon the altar of truth. That is the fellowship that binds men and wins battles even with pebbles against mailed giants, though hell should belch forth millionaires and Satan bar the way."

The colonist rates from all points in the East to all points in Oregon commence Sept. 1st and continue until Oct. 31st. Every commercial organization and every citizen of Oregon should begin to make these rates the subject of every letter that goes out of the state. The fare is \$30 from Missouri river points, St. Paul, Duluth and Winnipeg, \$33 from St. Louis and \$38 from Chicago, with proportionate rates from every point in the United States.

The Cherry fair at Salem last week was a great success and many were present from Portland and other points.

THE COUNTY ROCK CRUSHER ARRIVES

On Thursday evening the county rock crusher steamed into town with its crew, having left Eugene Tuesday. However, a slight break delayed it one-half day on the trip. On this Friday morning the crusher and crew proceeded out to Silk creek where the crusher crew will take up work on the old Cottage Grove-Lorane road where they left off a few years ago and it is the intention to place crushed rock on the remaining unimproved portion of the road to Lorane, a distance of seven miles. With this work completed, the old road from this place to Lorane, a distance of 12 miles, will have been graded and covered with crushed rock and will soon become an ideal country road, both winter and summer. Much work has been done this summer on the new Cottage Grove-Lorane road and ere long there will be two first class wagon roads connecting Cottage Grove with the Lorane valley.
