

# LIVE COUNTY SEAT AND COURT HOUSE NOTES

Sheriff Harry Bown has sold his farm of 412 acres west of Irving to E. T. Virgin for \$25 per acre.

Charles Destal has filed with the county clerk notice of location of the "Texas" mining claim in the Bohemia district. M. F. Wyatt filed notice of the "Saturn" claim in the same district.

W. F. Hart, John Allen, and N. P. Christian, the appraisers appointed in the estate of Nathaniel Martin, deceased, have filed their report showing having found property belonging to the estate which they value at \$1,500.

C. M. Collier and party of surveyors, consisting of his son Percy, Sigfried Maurer, Eugene Haribart, Aubrey Bond, left for the north fork of the Siuslaw river on Monday morning to finish the work of sectionizing the only remaining section of unsurveyed government land outside of the national forests, and this may be partly within the limits of the Tillamook forest. It is very rough mountain land and will not be a very easy job.

A large crowd of Eugene citizens wandered down to the new depot Saturday to see the Cottage Grove local come in to the new depot, which was the first train to come in under the new regime and for which tickets were sold from the new office. It is certainly a beauty and would be a credit to any city no matter how large. The waiting rooms are large and airy and as clean and neat as can be. The seats are large and comfortable and suggest genuine comfort with simply a look, as there are no iron divisions so common in depots. It is well lighted and suggests an air of importance to travelers passing through. It was a great thing the S. P. company did for Eugene when they built that new depot and fixed up their yards.—Register.

More men are being sent to work on the logging railroad of the Booth-Kelly Company at Wendling. The company expects to finish the six or seven-mile stretch for winter operations.

Henry Coleman, a pioneer of 1851, and for many years one of the leading men of the upper Willamette valley, died Friday morning at the home of Jesse Seals, on the donation claim that his father took up when he and his family crossed the plains. At the time of his death he was nearly 84 years old, having been born in Bunker county, Pennsylvania, on August 31, 1824. The cause of death was old age. He was never married.

Arthur Edward Taylor, who has been working for Charles Rivett and was known among his fellow workmen as "Teddy", lost his life in the McKenzie at Hayden's bridge shortly after dinner on Sunday. He and his family (a wife and child) with several other families started out Sunday morning to spend the day at Hayden's bridge, enjoying the outing fishing and having a good time. They had taken dinner and the men had gone up the river from the bridge a little distance to fish for trout.

"Teddy" had gone around the bend from the others and had got out on a log from which he was fishing and either accidentally fell in, or grew dizzy and fainted, or as many suppose, suffered an attack of heart disease and dropped into the water. A. T. Miles, a friend who is employed by the telephone company, tried to swim to Taylor, but though he got within a few feet of him the swift current swept the stragling man out of his reach. A slight bruise on the head and slight struggles indicate that Taylor might have been stunned before the current gripped him.

## MAY RESUME WORK ON COOS BAY ROAD

The S. P. Co. has a gang of men and several teams at work repairing the new county road at several places between Drain and Elkton, which the company built a year or more ago where the railway right-of-way interfered with the old county road. It begins to look like the S. P. is getting ready to resume work on the new railroad to Coos Bay.—Drain Nonpareil.
