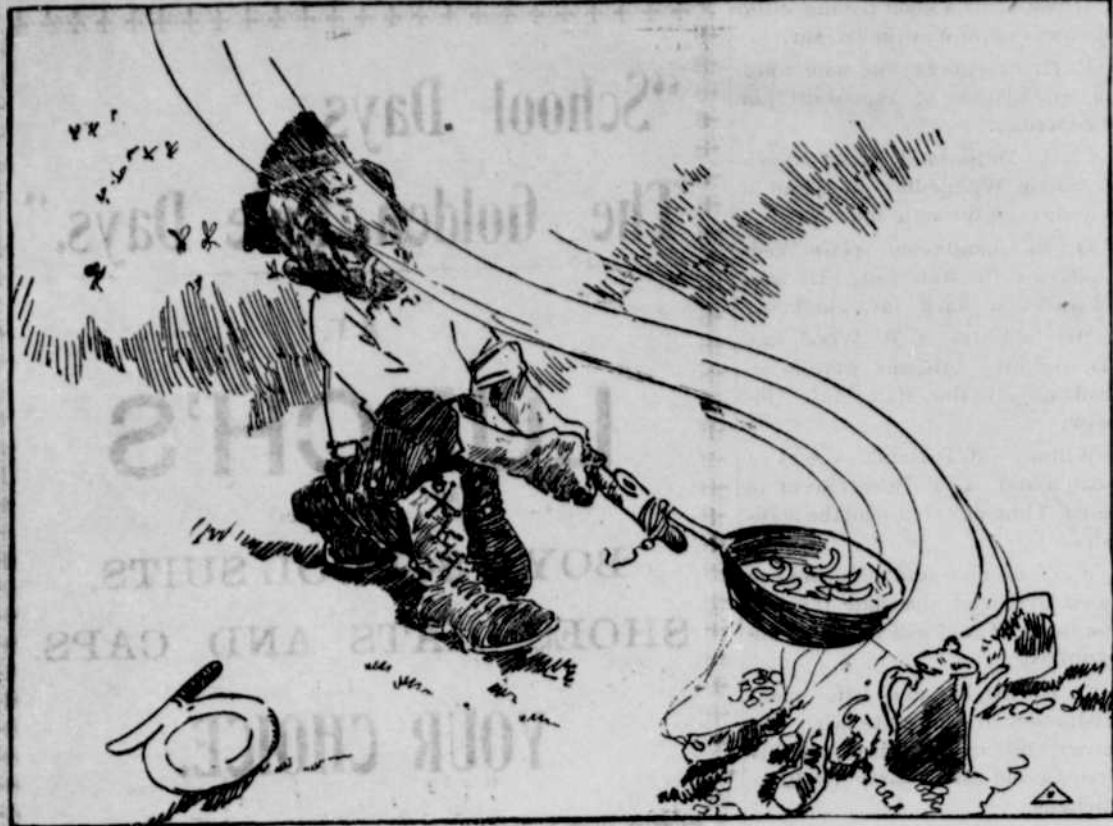

Much recent legislation of doubtful constitutionality, congressional and state, has been practically enforced by provisions for minatory, heavy and cumulative fines and imprisonment, devised in some cases expressly for the purpose of preventing a resort to the courts for relief.

NO GOVERNMENT CAN WITH IMPUNITY CONTINUE TO EXERCISE SUCH OPPRESSION.

JUDICIAL JUDGMENTS ARE NOT ACCORDED THE SAME RECEPTION AS FORMERLY. INDIVIDUAL JUDGES SHOULD BE AS SAILED IF THEY ARE CORRUPT OR INCOMPETENT. IT IS NO ASSAULT UPON THE INSTITUTION TO ATTACK THEM FOR SUCH CAUSES IN A PROPER WAY. WHILE IMPROVEMENT SHOULD NOT BE LIGHTLY INVOKED, YET IT IS AN INDISPENSABLE SAFEGUARD.

Perhaps the judges are not altogether free from blame. When in the decision of cases of great public importance, upon which the attention of the whole country is centered, they assail opposing opinions as subversive of the constitution and fraught with direst evils for the future of the country, IT IS NOT SURPRISING IF SUCH REITERATION WILL IN TIME UNDERMINE THE PUBLIC CONFIDENCE IN AT LEAST THE WISDOM OF THE COURTS.
