General Theodore Bingham and the Kaiser—Representative Hefflin. The Vanderbilt Family's New Troubles.

White House and social and military aid to the president. In this post he exercised a strong sway over the conduct of state functions at the executive mansion. He was born in Andover, Conn., in 1858 and graduated in 1879 from the West Point academy. He lost his leg about five years ago through the falling of a derrick while engaged in engineering work at Buffalo and was promoted to brigadier general's rank and placed on the retired list of the army shortly afterward. In early days General Bingham was military attaché at the German embassy. He tells a story of his first visit to the Kaiser. As he went into the room he noticed that the German ruler was looking at a picture of Lookout mountain. He had barely time to absorb this fact when the Kaiser greeted him in excellent English most affably, asking if he were the new American attaché. No sooner had the necessary greetings been exchanged, however, than the Kaiser referred to the picture.

"You've been on Lookout mountain, I suppose?" he inquired. The captain said he had. "Then tell me," continued the ruler, "where it was that Hooker's troops came over. Was it here (pointing to one slope), or was it here (pointing to another spot on the picture)?" The attaché explained the route of Hooker's troops, and the Kaiser said: "Now, I've always wanted to know exactly where the fight took place. Was it here or here?" He was informed that it had been on a bench of the mountain, at the bottom of a sheer precipice stretching down from one side of the summit, and he appeared extraordinarily pleased at learning the facts from one who knew.
