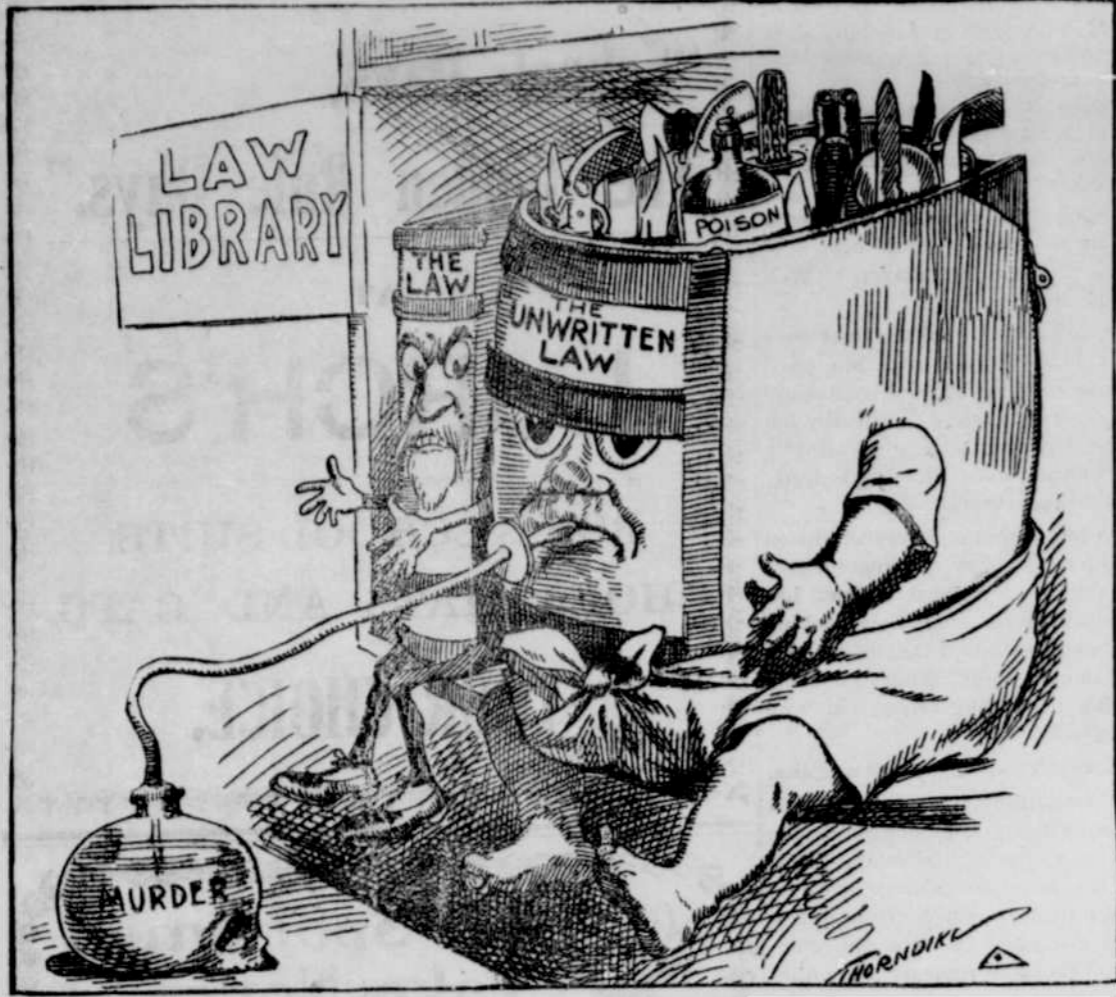

THE KYAITTEYO PAGODA.

Its Seemingly Dangerous Position on a Rocking Boulder.

There are a good many rocking boulders in the world. One of the most remarkable is in the Andes of South America. Often persons sitting beneath it are overcome with the idea that it is about to fall upon them. One would think the same kind of impression would be made upon any one who made the experiment of sitting or standing immediately beneath the Kyaitteyo pagoda on the Kelasa hills, in Burma. It is supposed to be miraculously balanced and held in place by a hair of the great teacher and prophet of India, Gautama Buddha, which is believed by the faithful to lie beneath the boulder. It does



seem to the observer as if nothing but a miracle could prevent the great rock from rolling off its perch and plowing its way through the dense jungle below. Through this jungle, which is infested with snakes and tigers and wild elephants with voracious appetites, come hundreds of faithful followers of Buddha on pilgrimages to the shrine on top of the boulder. They believe that the performance of the pilgrimage counts a good deal toward increasing the high standing they will enjoy in the next world. The place is several days' journey from the nearest town. The pilgrims make many offerings.

A PICTURESQUE RUIN.

San Francisco's Wrecked City Hall and Its Great Dome.

Earthquake and fire partially destroyed the \$10,000,000 San Francisco city hall, but the great dome was left standing, with its steel frame heretofore most of its covering. It makes a picturesque ruin. Engineers decided that the dome of the city hall was perfectly solid. Nevertheless the supervisors voted that it would be unwise to rebuild the city hall as a whole without rebuilding the dome, so the latter must come down. This means that two-thirds of the great structure must be razed, the east wing of the city hall having now been reconstructed. It is expected that the work of demolition will cost \$100,000 and will keep 500 men and 200 teams busy for three months. About 80,000 cubic yards of debris will have to be removed, and this will represent



SAN FRANCISCO'S WRECKED CITY HALL, something like 1,000 wagon loads of debris, including 20,000,000 bricks. Only 2 per cent of these bricks can be used over again, because they were laid with cement mortar and the blasting and chiseling necessary to separate them destroy them. The broken bricks are not entirely useless, however. They are hauled to a field near by, where they are ground into "fire-proofing" at the rate of thirty tons daily.
