At Dallas, Polk county the city council has placed a license of \$600 a year on all sellers of "near beer" and licenses have been taken out by local dealers.

The Republican registration in Oregon up to the present time is 80,921 and the democratic registration up to the same date is 28,788. Looks like Mr. Bryan has pretty big odds against him in Oregon.

A ten-acre 7 year-old apple orchard in the Hood river valley was sold the other day for \$16,000. What a bright prospect ahead for the Willamette valley orchardist who will conduct his business along the same lines.

Senator Gore laid considerable stress on the panic last fall under a republican administration and a protective tariff. It might have been a panic east of the Rockies, but over here in the Pacific northwest it was only a holiday.

Mr. Haskell of Oklahoma, wanted the facts in regard to his connection with the Standard Oil and the result reminds us of one of Champ Clark's stories. He says that out in Wyoming, close to the public highway, is a mound with a wooden slab at its head, upon which is crudely carved an epitaph reading: "He whistled for the grizzly and the grizzly came."

It is evident that Attorney General Bonaparte is not enjoying his office any more. He is not getting the glory out of it, with the courts turning down his legal arguments in the great cases that arise from time to time. Prosecuting the trusts is not the merry-go-round, possibly that he had imagined it to be. Mr. Bonaparte longs for March 3.

Bandon has an organized incorporated chamber of commerce composed of wide awake business men that devote their best energies to promoting plans that will build up a city. The people of the place do not hesitate to put up money for feasible projects when called upon, knowing that they are liable to receive two dollars for every one invested in the majority of cases. This is why the "City by the Sea" is forging ahead of other towns in the county. Real estate prices have been kept down to a reasonable figure. And any person of thirty dollars can purchase a lot within ten minutes walk of the city wharf.

Many of the new comers are somewhat taken back by the recent frosts we have had and well they may be. Mr. Chase, who lives a few miles of Eugene makes a close study of the weather and records the temperature and we are told that the thermometer was as low on Wednesday night of last week as it was all last winter. It was down to 24 degrees and is colder than we had it at any time last winter. This is most unusual for Oregon, however, we should not complain, as Colorado and other Rocky mountain states had a blinding snow storm at the same time, resulting in a terrible train wreck Friday near Butte, in which 19 people were killed and 50 injured, some fatally.

A Marshfield dispatch says: Colonel W. H. Holabird, of San Francisco, is in Coos Bay as Mr. Harriman's representative to report on business conditions relative to the building of the Drain-Coos Bay railroad. The committee recently appointed to confer with Mr. Harriman at Roseburg, will assist Mr. Holabird in gathering necessary data as to the freight business in prospect for the new road. Mr. Holabird is the guest of General Manager C. I. Mills, of the Southern Pacific Co.

where Mr. Dewald was knocked down. This discovery, made in the presence of several citizens is considered conclusive evidence against the prisoners.

The prisoners will be given a preliminary hearing today when they will no doubt be remanded to the county jail at Eugene to await trial in the circuit court.

MR. DEWALD PROSTRATED.

Mr. Dewald spent a rather restless night, although he was calm and self-possessed, as he was when he pluckily grappled with the hold-up men. However, he is weak and almost prostrate today from loss of blood and the violent strain experienced in his tussle with the two ruffians who attacked him. It is the general opinion, however, that he will soon recover from his injuries and severe experience.

The Cottage Grove officers are to be again complimented for their pluck and alertness, having several times in the past two years proven themselves more than an equal for the most desperate transient criminals. Thugs will soon begin to steer clear of Cottage Grove.

HASKELL JOINS DOWN AND OUT CONTINGENT

Chicago, Sept. 25.—Governor Charles N. Haskell at midnight resigned his position as treasurer of the democratic national committee. His resignation was announced by himself after he had conferred with officials at democratic headquarters.

In giving out his decision, Mr. Haskell, in response to a question, declared he did not desire to be responsible for any embarrassment which might result to the democratic party by his retaining the office of treasurer.

Gov. Haskell's resignation was brought about by charges preferred against him by Hearst and President Roosevelt in which it was shown that he was a corporation sympathizer and had been connected with the Standard Oil manipulations in Oklahoma.

Haskell was chairman of the democratic national platform committee at the Denver presidential convention and was at that time elected treasurer of the democratic national committee.

"AUNT ANN" WALLACE RECEIVES BAD INJURY

Mrs. Hamilton Wallace, more familiarly known as "Aunt Ann" fell while pursuing her kitchen work Monday morning and sustained a badly sprained left hip. It was first feared that the hip was dislocated, but Dr. J. O. Van Winkle, after making an examination reported that it was only severely sprained, but that Mrs. Wallace, owing to her advanced age—76 years—will naturally be confined to her bed several days as a result of her severe injury. She is reported as resting easy.

Hunter and Deer Killed.

Near Roseburg Sunday Geo. Buxton, aged 24, shot and wounded a large buck deer. In attempting to cut its throat with a hunting knife, the deer sprang to its feet and viciously attacked Buxton fatally goring him with its horns. Both hunter and deer were found lying dead together.
