### SOME PERTINENT QUESTIONS.

On the assumption that no firm can continue in business without patronage, the Oregonian asks Mayor Lane why he does not let the immoral women of Portland remain in their present quarters, and then arrest every male specimen seen entering those joints? And the question is extremely pertinent. Why should there be for men a set of morals less ideal than those set up for women? Why should woman be harassed for offering temptation and a male partner in crime escape the law? During October the Southern Pacific will operate a farming demonstration train through the Willamette valley. On the train will be a number of high class dairy cows, and the most modern and successful dairying methods will be shown. There will also be horticultural and agricultural exhibits, and best methods of budding, grafting, pruning, spraying and packing fruit shown.

Notwithstanding the fact that no 15,000 were sold on the grounds and there was no pool selling either, the state fair was a far greater success this year than ever. On the floor of the House of Representatives during the last legislative session, the writer heard several members declare that to cut these two things out would ruin the fair. Then there is the unwritten alliance, dictated by common aims and interests, where the wishes and desires of each run parallel. Of the two which is the stronger?

TO STATE IT DIFFERENTLY, AN ALLIANCE TO BE USEFUL AND LASTING MUST BE BASED ON COMMON INTERESTS. IF IT IS SO BASED THE MEREFACT THAT IT IS REDUCED TO WRITING DOES NOT STRENGTHEN IT MUCH. IF IT IS NOT SO BASED THE WRITING AND THE SEALS ADD LITTLE STRENGTH.



### CASE AFTER CASE

Nothing ads so much to the attraction of a town as to see all the houses neatly painted. It is rumored that the fruit brokers of New York City got together recently, had a midnight meeting down in the sub-way, and decided that they were not going to pay fancy prices for Oregon and Washington apples. There was at least one commission man who did not attend this meeting, however, and he sneaked off to Hood River and bought 80,000 boxes. A grapevine telegram says that 150,000 more have been sold and eastern commission men have been plentiful in the Yakima, Rogue River, Grande Ronde, Wenatchee, and other fruit producing sections.

The latest statistics from the Internal Revenue department show a falling off in the home production of whiskey during the past 12 months of no less than 14,333,671 gallons, which is a shrinkage of about 11 per cent. No doubt this will be credited or debited to the spread of the prohibition movement in certain sections of the country. However, the near beer trade has probably expanded at about the above ratio.
