IT IS ALL VERY WELL TO HAVE THE PHRASEOLOGY OF LAWS SUPPLIED BY THE LAWYERS, BUT THE CHARACTER OF THOSE LAWS SHOULD BE DOMINATED BY THE MEN WHO FROM ASSOCIATION AND EXPERIENCE ARE FAMILIAR WITH THE NECESSITIES OF THE SITUATION.

It's all nonsense to maintain that simply experience in machine politics is the preparation that is needed for the consideration of the problems in legislation and administration that are confronting the country today.

The business man from the point of view of enlightened self interest is beginning to realize the fact that he COULD NOT MAKE A BETTER INVESTMENT than to devote some part of his time to active political work. This is especially true in municipal politics, where the reluctance of business men to make personal sacrifice in this direction has resulted in a bad element obtaining control in the municipal government.

We want to get rid of ward politicians, of men who make their living out of politics. But it cannot be done if business men keep out of politics. There has been too much staying out of politics simply because it's the fashion.

Teach Religion Seven Days a Week.

RELIGION should be combined with the other studies of the public school. Man has other faculties besides intellect that demand training and culture—the moral and religious faculties that lift him above the mere animal brute state.

A sufficiently deep impression cannot be made on the child for good in the hour devoted to Sunday school each week, even to counteract the evil influences of the days of the week, much less to MOLD AND FASHION CHARACTER.
