More fruit trees will be set out this fall in southern Oregon than ever before.

There is bound to be prosperous times ahead for the Leader no matter which "Bill" is elected November 3rd as both old parties are represented by its editors.

Queer that two men, neither having a bank account or a reasonable prospect of ever having one, will argue for an hour and even come to blows occasionally, over the question of guaranteeing bank deposits.

Judge Humphrey, of Illinois, in a recent decision affecting the liquor interests from Maine to California and from Oregon to Florida says whiskey must have age and color or be labeled imitation. This is evidence that Judge Humphrey is a good judge of whiskey.

The Leader management has heard many expressions from business men endorsing the proposition of building a concrete sidewalk on at least, the south side of Main street, from the depot to the river, a distance of five blocks, one or two blocks of such pavement having already been laid. It would add much to the appearance of the street, would increase property values and would be a permanent improvement.

Governor Chamberlain has declined to take any part in the democratic campaign in favor of the election of Bryan, giving as his reason that he believes a chief executive should not take an active part in campaigns during his incumbency. His refusal was announced in a letter to Alex Sweek, chairman of the Democratic State Central committee, who had urged the governor to make a few speeches in this state in Bryan's behalf.

Seventeen young men unconscious and five of them unable to play and removed to a hospital, is the record of a game played of football at Schenectady, N. Y., between Union college and Wesleyan. It is reported that the game was played strictly according to rules. One captain with a broken collarbone and the other with contusion of the brain is the chief evidence that it was a rational performance. The war news should be dated from Schenectady, not Bulgaria. None of the Serbian army have been taken to a hospital yet.

The Southern Pacific demonstrating train will stop at Cottage Grove from 8.30 a. m. to 10 a. m. Monday, November 9. The farmers should not fail to visit this train and witness the many interesting demonstrations given therein relating to modern dairying, fruit growing and farming, besides much labor saving machinery. The demonstrations are under the supervision of the Oregon Agricultural college.

Sales of farm and fruit lands in this county are growing in frequency right along. Lane county soil is worth good money because it will bring large returns on the investment.

On November 3, the country will vote on two bills, accepting one and rejecting the other.

Senator Fulton will speak at a big rally at Eugene next Tuesday.

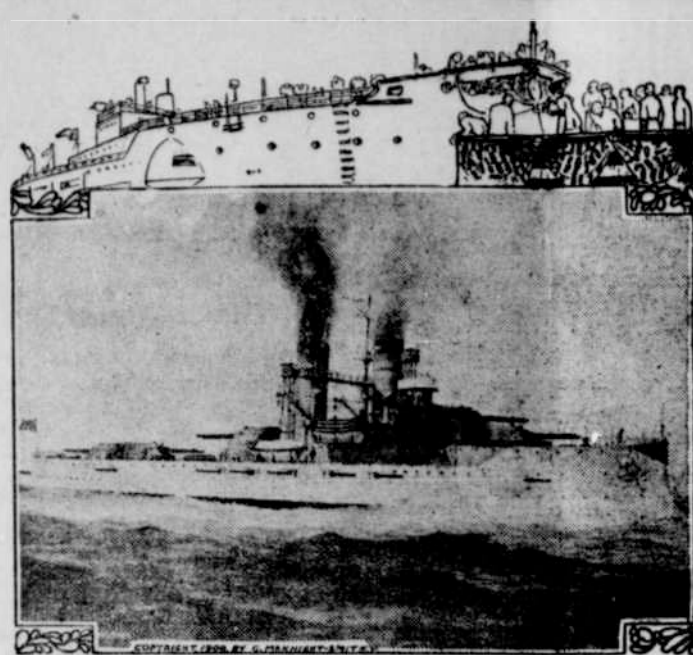
A New Fruit Pest.

S. B. Morss, the nurseryman, was presented with some pest infested pear leaves some time ago by a local fruit grower and was unable to account for the little black spots thereon, so he sent the leaves to the O. A. C. experiment station and received the following letter in return:

S. B. Morss, Cottage Grove, Ore.
Dear Sir: In reply to your letter of October 17th, which has been referred to me, have to report your pear leaves are infested with the pest known as the pear leaf blister mite. This little insect is very common and sometimes does considerable damage in interfering with the proper functions of the leaves. It can be very readily controlled by spraying the trees just as the leaf buds are starting in spring with the winter strength lime-sulphur. I take pleasure in sending you a copy of bulletin 75 which contains direction for preparing this spray.

ANOTHER BIG BATTLESHIP APPROACHING COMPLETION.

The North Dakota, the first 20,000 ton battleship of the Dreadnought type, is about ready to be launched at Fore River, Mass. This monster fighting machine is similar to the Delaware, now building at Newport News, Va. It will be driven by turbines and is expected to have a speed of twenty-one knots an hour. It will carry ten twelve-inch guns and fourteen five-inch guns as a secondary battery.

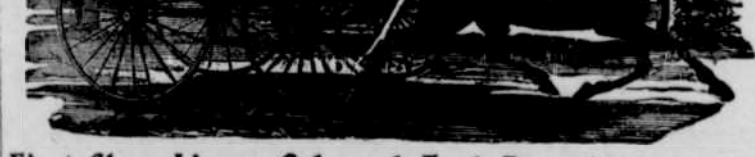
