### NEW COLLECTION SCHEME.

In Oregon you must not ask a man on election day how he intends to vote, of what he thinks about the questions to be voted on, or try to show him, in the way of friendly conversation, what you think about matters involved in the election. If you do you will fall under the ban of "the corrupt practice act." To Hades with the humbug, and its propagators! Not a jury in Oregon would convict a man for uttering fair and honest speech on election day. But U'Ren might be convicted by a jury, in any county, for drawing up such an act. A section of the corrupt practice act, passed by the people last June, makes it a misdemeanor, punishable by a heavy fine and imprisonment, for county and state officials to contribute toward any religious, charitable, political or other organization, if asked, while they hold office. This feature of the law was the cause that led to the defeat of the measure when it was before the legislature. The people however, saw fit to enact the measure by a large majority vote. State and county officials are naturally liberal and generally give to all requests, but now they are compelled to refuse all such applications.

### DR. SCARBROUGH ON FRUIT GROWING

Dr. L. D. Scarbrough was in Eugene from Creswell Saturday and added to the exhibits of the Commercial club some of the finest apples and prunes ever grown in Oregon. He has sold his entire prune crop of 400,000 or 500,000 pounds, evaporated, at a good price, f. o. b., Creswell, and has seven or eight carloads of first grade apples for which he expects a high price.

Dr. Scarbrough is one of the most successful fruit growers in the state, and believe that the Willamette Valley will eventually be the greatest fruit district, for apples, as well as prunes, in the west, because of the large area of land suitable for the fruit industry, far exceeding that of Hood River or Rogue River valleys. All that is necessary to make a success of the business here is proper cultivation and attention, combined with approved methods of picking and packing. The climate, because of its moisture is conducive to high coloring of apples, so the doctor thinks, as it brings out of the soil the mineral properties necessary for this effect.—Guard.
