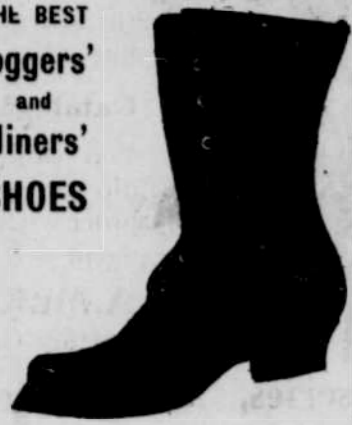

A Temporary Assignment.

The Wheeler-Thompson Co. of Cottage Grove has made an assignment for the benefit of all their creditors. Their assets, which consist of good salable merchandise, figure up to \$20,300 and their liabilities, which have practically all been reported, amount to \$11,140.-88. It is generally believed and understood that the embarrassing condition under which they are now struggling, will be removed within a few weeks by their assignee, W. H. Abrams, who will take the stock of goods and dispose of enough of it to pay all the debts, when they can resume business again. George B. Dorris is their attorney. They make this assignment so as to save the costs of bankruptcy proceedings, and their creditors can all get what is due them, as the assets are ample to pay all claims and leave them a good margin besides.
