### GARDINER PREACHER FIGHTS EXTRADITION

Sheriff B. Fenton, of Roseburg, Douglas county, was in this city today with a prisoner, a Rev. Summers, whom he arrested at Gardiner. With this prisoner the sheriff went to Salem to get out extradition papers, in order to return the prisoner to Texas, where he is wanted, and on returning to Roseburg, the prisoner is said to have mysteriously disappeared from the custody of the sheriff at Junction. The sheriff left the train at that place and not finding any trace of his man telephoned to Marshal Snodgrass of this city who boarded the train here, found the prisoner and detained him until the sheriff arrived, when the trip was continued to Roseburg on the afternoon train today.

Regarding the arrest a telegram of Monday from Roseburg says: In custody of Sheriff, Fenton, Rev. Mr. Summers, or Clark, arrested at Gardiner last Saturday, left Monday morning for Salem to fight extradition to Throckmorton, Texas, where he is said to have been indicted in 1904 on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences. The minister claims it is a case of mistaken identity. If he is the right man, however, he faces a more serious charge than the one he was indicted on. While at Gardiner with his supposed wife and their two children, Summers, alias Clark, was recognized by a man named Jack Parrott as a former acquaintance at Throckmorton, while his wife is alleged by Parrott to be his playmate of childhood and not the woman whom he knew to be Summers' wife in Texas. Suspecting something wrong, Parrott wrote to relatives in Texas, and the result was that a warrant was telegraphed for the minister's arrest. Summers cannot produce his marriage certificate and refuses to say when and where he was married.
