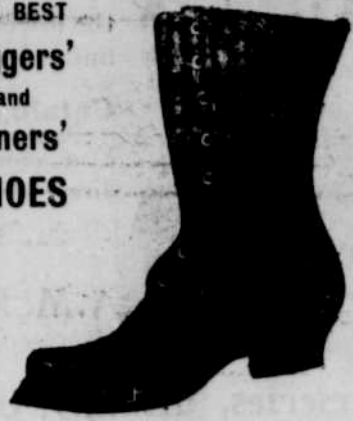

## DEBATING TRYOUT OF CITY SCHOOLS

Last Friday evening a good sized audience assembled at the armory hall to listen to the debating tryout by the high school to determine who should be honored with a place on the State League Debating Team.

Professor E. K. Barnes, superintendent of the city schools, presided and efficient judges were selected. The first question submitted was, Resolved, "That the negro in the United States has been wronged to a greater extent than the Indian." Affirmative, Gladys Farley, leader; Elsie Brewer, Negative, John Cooter and Ernest Anderson. Both sides presented able arguments, while Miss Farley received hearty applause for her originality and witty retort.

The next question was, Resolved, "That war has been more detrimental to the human family than intemperance." Affirmative, Allie Phillips, leader; Mable Rosenberg, Negative, Gertrude Hogate and Maud Hooper. This question was also ably handled on both sides.

The third team discussed the question, Resolved, "That foreign immigration is detrimental to the welfare of our nation." Affirmative, Marvin Jordan, leader; Luther King, Negative, Ben King and Melvin Jordan. The boys tried hard enough but did not succeed in settling this vexing question.

Queer enough there was no negative speaker to take issues with Miss Myrtle DeSpain on the last and most important question, locally, so we must conclude that no one cared to attempt to oppose the affirmative or else, and most probably, there is no negative side to the question, which was, Resolved, "That a new county should be formed from the southern part of Lane county and the northern part of Douglas." Miss DeSpain handled the question in a masterly and very convincing manner.

This closed the debate and the judges after considerable deliberation selected John Cooter, Misses Allie Phillips and Maud Hooper, as the three debaters to be honored with a place on the State League Debating Team. Prof. Barnes called the victors to the platform and congratulated them upon their success, at the same time complimenting all those who participated in the contest, announcing that the score was very close. The first debate in which the team selected will participate is being arranged with the Junction High school and will probably be held at this place soon.

## THINK COOS BAY BRANCH WILL RESUME IN 1909

Drain, Nov. 19.—As an evidence of the early resumption of work on the Oregon Western, commonly known as the Coos Bay branch of the Southern Pacific, from this place to Marshfield, construction of which was begun two years ago, and on which work was stopped about ten months ago, coincident with that of nearly all similar enterprises throughout the country, the engineer in charge here has ordered that a force of 30 or 40 men be put to work on the public road at places where it is necessary to make new road in lieu of that taken by the railroad right of way. It is believed here that construction work on the railroad branch will begin early next year.
